One of the most important undertakings of the school during the year was the dramatization of the pageant, "On Our Way." This was presented primarily to acquaint the public with the educational objectives of the school. The pageant was divided into four parts, Self-realization, Human Relationship, Economic Efficiency, and Civic Responsibility. These objectives were shown by means of characterizations and short acts.
The cast for the pageant was composed of students from the Junior and Senior High Schools, and faculty members throughout the city. Altogether the cast numbered approximately one hundred and twenty-five persons. Members of the three choruses also contributed immense!'y to the success of the play.
The scenery for the entire pageant was made by the boys in our own Industrial Arts Department.
This pageant was one of the largest projects that the school has undertaken for quite a while. Its success was attributed mainly to the splendid cooperation of all those concerned with the production. Certainly the faculty members who were responsible for its presentation and the cast should be commended for presenting such a worthwhile activity.
