## JUNIOR STUDENT COUNCIL

The Junior Student Council is an organization which gives the students an opportunity to be active, participating citizens in the school community. First organized in 1930 as an experiment in student participation in the affairs of the school, it is now respondsible for the entire activities program of the junior division of the high school.

The four officers and their assistants are elected to represent the entire student body. The councilors and alternate councilors represent each of the eighteen homerooms. At the weekly meetings, members of the council stand on their own feet and express their own opinions or those of the homerooms which they represent. After discussion of a school project or problem, action is taken by the councii. The principal reserves the right to approve or veto any action of the council. Actions of the council are reported back to the weekly homeroom meetings,

The work of the council is carried on through a number of standing committees which make weekly reports to the council. This year they were the assembly, athletic, clubs, noon-hour, scholarship, sales tax stamps, school savings, and traffic committees.

Following are some of the activities of the council for this year: sponsoring of a noon-hour intramural volleyball and basketball series for both boys and girls; supervision of a school savings program; organization of a system of hall guards ; collection and tabulation of sales tax stamps; granting of club charters; supervision of homeroon elections and planning of home room programs. The chief social event was a covered dish dinner and dance for members of the council and guests, Mr. Fishel, Mr. Steffen, and Mr. Williams. The culminating activity is "Awards Day", an assembly whei" certificates are given to students in recognition of meritorious service to the school. In cooperation with the Senior Council, the Junior Council sponsored the annual magazine drive and the election of a home-coming queen.

The council also serves as a "booster club" for all school projects such as a Junior Red Cross membership drive, donations to the Community Fund, a one-hundred per cent donation drive for the March of Dimes, and the very successful Spring Carnival.
