Junior Student Council

The Junior Student Council is the organization which gives the students an opportunity to be active participating citizens in the school community.

First organized in 1930 as an experiment in student participation in the affairs of the school, in the last twenty-five years it has developed into a vital and important organization which contributes to the improvement of the school and to the welfare of the entire student body. It is now a member of the Ohio Student Council Association.

The four officers and their assistants are elected by, represent, and serve the entire student body. The councilors and alternate councilors represent each of the eighteen homerooms.

Council meetings, held each Monday, are conducted according to parliamentary procedure. Here, students express their own opinions or those of the homerooms they represent. After discussion of a school problem or project, action is taken by the council. The principal reserves the right to approve or veto any action of the council. Decisions of the council are reported back to the students at weekly homeroom meetings.

The work of the council is carried on through a number of standing committees which make weekly reports to the council. Committees for this year were: assembly, athletic, clubs, noon-hour, scholarship, sales tax stamps, school savings, and traffic.

Among the problems undertaken by the council this year were: school property, better citizenship, courtesy, teen-age problems, school marks, careers, selection of subjects, safety, and activities.

Following are some of the activities of the council for this year: sponsoring of a noon-hour intramural volleyball and basketball series for both boys and girls, supervision of school-savings program, organization of a system of hall guards, collection and tabulation of sales tax stamps, granting of club charters, supervision of homeroom elections, planning homeroom programs, adoption of a set of rules for social affairs, presentation of several outside assembly programs, and the selection of a student council pin.

A most enjoyable and educational experience was a visit to the New Philadelphia City Council, when members of the Junior Council sat with and observed the councilmen at work.

President William Carpenter was sent as a delegate to the Convention of the Ohio Student Council Association at Columbus, Ohio, on April 29 and 30.

In co-operation with the Senior Council, the Junior Council sponsored the annual magazine drive, selection of a high school pennant design, election of a home-coming queen, Junior Red Cross drive, Community Fund drive, attained 100 per cent participation in the March of Dimes drive, and served as a "Booster Club" for the annual Spring Carnival.

The chief social event was a dinner and party for members of both the Junior and Senior Councils, plus Mr. Fishel, Mr. Steffen, Mr. Williams, and Miss Milar.

The culminating event was "Recognition Day," an assembly where certificates of Merit are given to students in recognition of meritorious service to the school during the school year.

Turn Back the Clock

On January 25, 1955, the Senior Dramatics class, under the direction of Mrs. Thomas Semerville, presented the three-act comedy, "Turn Back the Clock." "Turn Back the Clock" is built around the universal truth that all generations are more or less alike, after all. 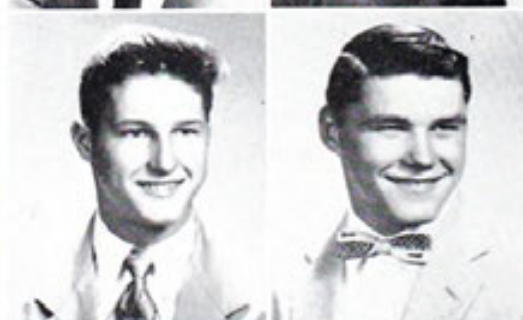
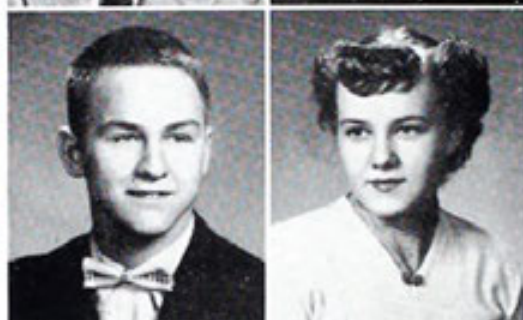

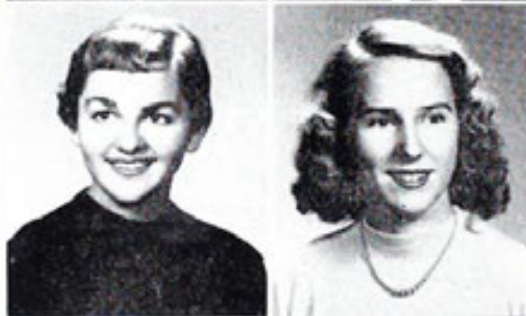
