
Foreword

Beloved of faculty and students alike, she was a tireless worker for the improvement of our school. Her passing is mourned by all who knew her.

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



The Central News is a member of the National Scholastic Press Association and has won numerous awards.




since everyone secretly tampers with the card file.


### ADVENTURELAND






In a special assembly held in our gym on December 20, the a cappella choir sang "The Christmas Story." All attending enjoyed the performance. The students were dismissed for the holidays.


