ewness has been the keynote this year within the faculty and administration. For approximately one-fourth of our faculty, this has been their initial year here. These instructors, in co-operation with veteran teachers, exchange classroom ideas and discuss teaching methods which may help to better inform their students. Both the faculty and administration face new problems which include an increased enrollment, a teacher shortage, and a need for more challenging courses, but these difficulties are sure to be overcome because the faculty and administration are constantly striving to improve our school.




### Superintendent Leon S. Force







# FOREIGN LANGUAGES










## **ENGLISH**








#### **COMMERCIAL**



To prepare oneself for a vocation in the business world. several commercial courses such as office machines, shorthand, commercial law, business math, and typing are offered at NPHS. Our school provides its students the opportunity to become acquainted with a number of business machines and proficient in the operation of one or two of them. To automatize the writing of brief forms and common phases and to build a business vocabulary, shorthand is offered to the student. Commercial law is offered as an elective to help the students develop the ability to recognize legal implications in their daily activities. Business math is of great importance in the daily activities of people as a tool for obtaining information upon the basis of which decisions may be made. A course in typing gives a student an opportunity to handle materials efficiently without loss of motion or time and to organize materials for work.



















### VOCATIONAL

The vocational curriculum consists of metal shop, industrial arts, auto shop, machine shop, and drafting. These courses prepare the boys for jobs during their senior year and directly upon graduation. In metal shop, students learn to become proficient in foundry methods. Industrial arts lays the foundation for a vocation using drafting, metal working, and wood-working. Overhauling transmissions and engines, rebuilding carburetors, re-aligning front ends, and adjusting brakes are some of the auto shop practices. Students are taught the fundamentals of machine operation in machine shop. Mechanical drawing and blueprinting offer an advanced study to boys interested in engineering.



















#### **GENERAL**



In addition to these other academic courses, many N.P.H.S. students take a general course of subjects. Girls who wish to obtain knowledge in sewing, cooking, baby care, tending to the sick, or even knitting can do so in the home economics course which is offered for three years. This subject prepares the girls immeasurably for marriage and child care.

Health, a one semester course, is required for all seniors. Through supplements of movies, demonstrations, charts and skeletons, much is learned about caring for the sick and one's own health. Also a first aid course is included which helps the students prepare for emergencies.

Psychology and economics, also one semester courses, give those who take these subjects a diversified academic schedule. These students become well-educated with a fundamental perception of these subjects.

The speech course at N.P.H.S. strives to teach students to listen effectively, to speak effectively, and to make good use of the inventions that have revolutionized communication. They learn to prepare and deliver speeches, debates and plays.









Notehand is a type of shorthand which is condensed into one semester to aid those students who will be continuing their education and will be taking many notes. This will help one to copy more complete intact notes.





The 1964 edition of the New Philadelphia Quakers, under the direction of Al Christopher and his seven able assistants, had the first winning season in New Phila since the 1957 team posted a 7-3 record. The Quakers finished 6-2-2 overall and 4-1-1 in the rugged Cardinal Conference. The Phils were tied with Dover for second place in the C.C.


By defeating Wooster in the first game of the season, the Phils ended a seven year streak without an opening game victory. From this victory to the 14-14 tie with Dover, the Quakers provided their fans with many thrills. The Quakers fell only to two state-ranked teams, Canton Lincoln and C.C. Champion Ashland. They also battled East Liverpool to an 8-8 stalemate on a muddy field.

With the defense giving the best it could, Rick Linard scored the TD and Mark Francis added the vital extra points with seconds left on the clock.





Although losing the opening contest of the season to Cambridge, the Quakers, under the leadership of Coach Leo Benjamin, got off to their finest start since 1943-1944, by winning eleven of their first thirteen games and finishing with a 14-5 record.


In the second game, against Malabar, Jan Fait, Ed Evans, and Rick Linard grabbed a record-breaking 66 rebounds to overwhelm the Malabar team 54-47.

The Quakers continued on their streak by posting six consecutive triumphs including a revenge win over Ashland, last year's C.C. champion. In the games against Ashland, Madison, and Alliance, All-Conference and All-District guard Mark Francis scored 27, 25, and 32 points respectively, including 16 for 16 fouls against Alliance. In the Ashland contest, senior Steve Arnold received the call to start at center, and his 20 points earned him a starting position.

During the overtime period with Coshocton, Tom Struchen, who made the All-Conference first team and the All-District second team, swished six free throws in as many tries to help defeat the Redskins 62-58. Following the overtime triumph, the Phils were upset by Wooster 40-38. The Quakers followed with four consecutive victories before bowing to a tall, talented Uhrichsville team by 84-68.





Five wrestlers will graduate this year, Ed Russell, Bill Shook, Lew Winston, Rich Hodder, and Rick Ellis.





In the field division, Jerry Bower pole-vaulted 11'3" and Tom Dindo threw the discus 142'5 1/2".




The baseball team this past season compiled a record of seven wins and nine losses and was in the running for the C. C. crown until the last game of the season.


These hard-working girls, who sacrifice a study hall to serve on the library staff, are an immense help to the librarian. These girls keep busy working at the desk, shelving


### PEP CLUB




## FRENCH CLUB

#### HI-Y


