Always looking ahead, Mr. Fuerst
planned for the summer jobs of the janitors at least three months ahead of time. If asked to do something by a student or teacher, he would try in every way possible to get it done. Often Mr. Fuerst would come as early as 5:00 a.m. and stay until 2:00 a.m. the following morning. No matter how busy he was, he always had time to talk.

This year, we at NPHS lost a wonderful friend and worker when Mr. Fuerst retired. In appreciation for every thing that Mr. Fuerst has done for NPHS, we, the members of the Delphian staff, feel that it is fitting to honor Mr. Fuerst by dedicating the 1966 Delphian to him.

## ENGLISH

NPHS has a broad program of English, giving each student a chance to study the English level best suited to his ability.

English is required of all sophomore and junior students. They study grammar and literature, concentrating on American authors. These basic courses prepare the student for further study of English in high school.

For the college bound student English 12A provides a thorough study of English literature, grammar and theme writing. Advanced work, consisting of character sketches and research papers, prepares these students for college English.

English 12B is specifically for commercial students. It prepares these pupils for a business career in bookkeeping or secretarial work.

English 12P, or Practical English is for the student who feels he needs more practice in the fundamentals of English grammar and literature.

To further our knowledge of the world around us, the students of NPHS undertake a wide program of social studies throughout their sophomore, junior, and senior years. World history gives the sophomores a brief knowledge of the entire world, from past to present. Besides their ordinary routine, these students are individually required to study countries which interest them, and to hand in notebooks concerning these countries. American history, which is the study of the development of our country, is studied by juniors and seniors. Having learned about the problems of a young country, and how Americans dealt with them, the seniors engage themselves in civics. Civics, a half-year project, helps the student realize the problems of government which face the world today. To reveal more, the civics classes obtain the New York Times and study it. Movies, slides and records help the student realize the importance of these courses, which are required for every student.

The science program of NPHS includes biology, advanced biology. chemistry, and physics. All of these subjects are made more interesting by the weekly dissecting and experimenting in the lab. The biology classes study plants and animals and their environment. Advanced biology is a more intensified study of the same field. What makes the world go 'round? The physics classes search for the answer when they study matter motion, and the effect of heat, light, electricity and sound on them. The study of chemistry helps the students better understand the composition of substances.

NPHS has many courses in mathematics which give the students a good mathematical background. These include Algebra I and II, geometry, and senior math. Both Algebra I and II deal with letters and symbols to solve for unknown quantities. Geometry consists of both plane and solid geometry, and gives the student several ways of making objects congruent. Senior math aids the college-bound student with higher, more difficult mathematics. including trigonometry and analytical geometry.

## FOREIGN LANGUAGES

French, Spanish, and Latin are elective foreign languages which are offered at NPHS.

In French I, II, and III, students study the culture of all French-speaking countries. French I is the study of basic grammar and vocabulary. French II students apply this knowledge through basic conversation. French literature is the main topic of study and discussion.

Spanish I, II, and III deals mainly with Spanish culture, conversation, and literature. Spanish I and II undertake basic grammar, vocabulary, conversation, and expression. Spanish III students study the Spanish literature, and also undertake the art of fluent Spanish conversation.

Latin I, II, and III students study Roman life and times. Basic grammar and vocabulary are studied in the first and second years. The third year deals mainly with the translation of Roman letters, poetry, and oration.

These languages supply the student with basic knowledge necessary for further training.

Many boys at NPHS have found that the best way to prepare for the future is to enroll in the vocational-industrial courses. Subjects offered in this field are industrial arts, mechanical drawing, metal working, and auto and machine shop. Industrial Arts I introduces the student to the principles of drafting, wood-working, and metal working. This study is furthered in Industrial Arts II, adding an intensive study of metals and electricity. Students taking blueprinting and mechanical drawing are able to get some preliminary training in engineering and in the field of architecture. In auto shop, students learn the fundamentals of auto repair, over-hauling transmissions and engines, rebuilding carburetors, re-aligning front ends, and adjusting brakes. The operation and maintenance of machines is taught in machine shop. By taking these subjects, boys can prepare themselves for jobs following graduation, and often during their senior year.

Since many girls plan to marry soon after graduation, NPHS offers to them three years of training in home economics. Girls in Home Economics I study foods, nutrition, and proper table setting the first semester and fabrics and their weave and durability the second semester. Second-year home economics students also study foods and fabrics plus homemaking and schedule planning. Girls in Home Economics III study knitting, child care, and home nursing, for which they receive a Red Cross home nursing card. After taking three years of home economics, girls are well prepared to step into the roles of wives and mothers.

There are six general courses offered at NPHS in addition to the academic and business subjects.

Health, a one semester course, is required of all seniors. Movies, demonstrations, and a first aid course make this subject an interesting and valuable one to the student. At the end of this course, each student receives a Red Cross certificate in first aid.

The speech course at NPHS gives the student a chance to participate in different aspects of drama, oratory, and debate and teaches them to speak and listen effectively.

Notehand, a one semester course, is a condensed type of shorthand for collegebound students. The purpose of Notehand is to enable the student to take more accurate and complete notes during lectures and discussions.

Psychology and economics, also one semester courses, give those students who take them a better understanding of the people they live and work with.

The 1965 Quaker football team carried on the winning ways at NPHS. Coach Al Christopher and his seven assistants guided the Quakers to a record of six wins and four losses. The Phils were in Cardinal Conference contention until the last two league games, but lost out on the first place chances with defeats at Coshocton and Dover.

The Quakers provided local fans with a surprising upset of highly touted Cincinnati Taft. In a tough defensive game, played in sweltering heat, the Quakers held off a late rally by the Senators to win $12-8$.

Racing off to their fastest start in eight years, the Quakers were tied for first place in the Cardinal Conference until a crucial defeat from the Roosevelt Robinson-led Ashland Arrows.

Completely controlling the second half, the Quakers grabbed the lead and held it until the last minute of the game. Dover had driven to the Phila three-yard line. Then, in a maddening fourteen seconds, the Quakers recovered the Tornado fumble, lost the ball, and lost a game. The Tornadoes punched the winning touchdown across the Phila goal line with five seconds left on the clock.

After a sluggish start the Phils reeled off ten straight victories, the longest consecutive winning streak since the 1940 state champions racked up an undefeated twenty-five game season.

The Quakers dropped the opening game to Maysville and could not seem to come up with the winning combination until the ninth grade of the year when they defeated Wooster. New Phila then became the hottest team in the conference. Exploding for a season high of ninety-three points at Mansfield Madison, the Quakers maintained a fast pace until the all-important Coshocton rematch. Clutch defensive play and rugged boardwork clinched the victory over the Redskins. However, the Quakers were upset in overtime in their opening tournament action by a tall Riverview squad.

Tom Struchen, second highest scorer in the league, was voted the most valuable player in the Cardinal Conference. He also earned a second team recognition in the Eastern District. Tim Baab was the only junior voted onto the All-Cardinal Conference team. Coahc Benjamin was acclaimed as Eastern District Coach of the Year for the second consecutive year.
