## Paperbacks, Field Trips Widened Scope of Study

The NPHS English department broadened its scope and location of study to meet the demands of social problems as well as those of scholastic challenge. Through a new program which provided paperback books at greatly reduced rates, the prejudices especially relevant to the times were explored and discussed. In addition, full-length movie versions of *The Grapes of Wrath* and *A Raisin in the Sun* dramatically portrayed the authors' creations. # New Communicative Arts Courses Added

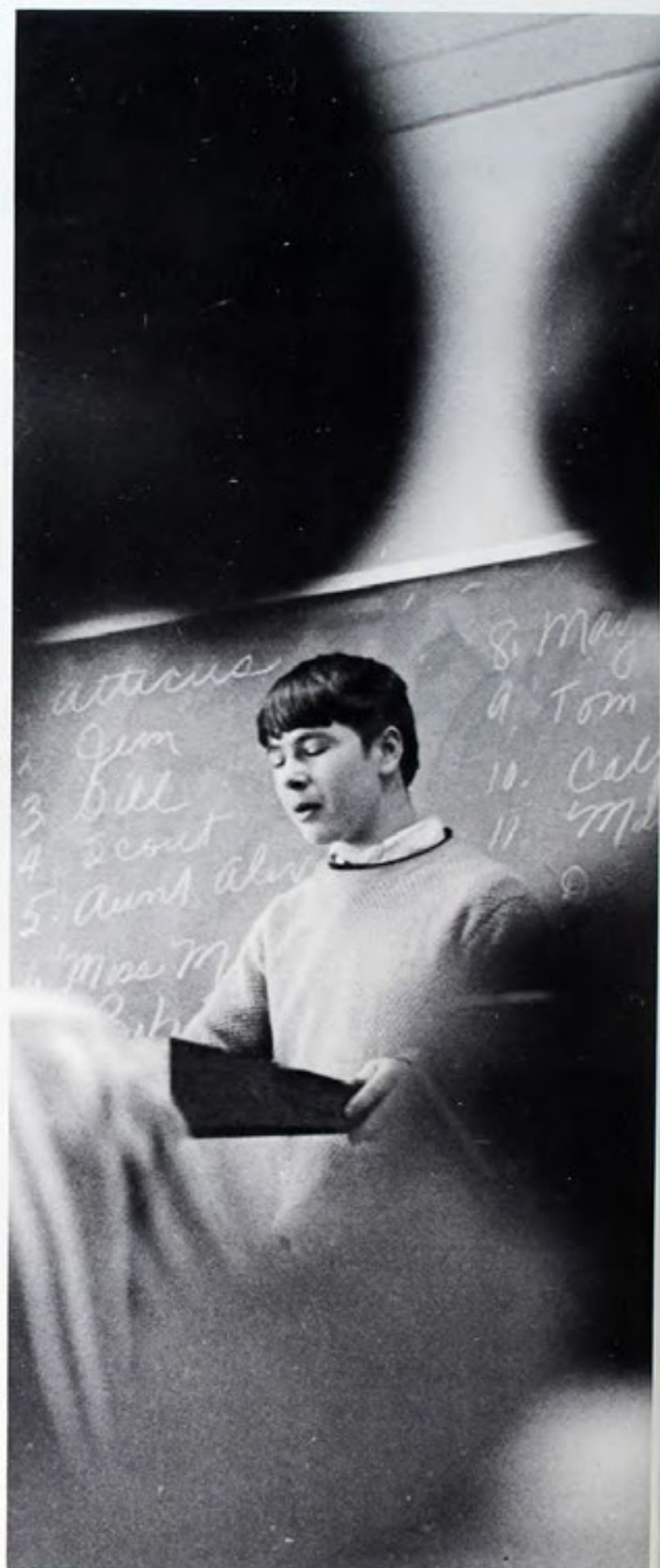

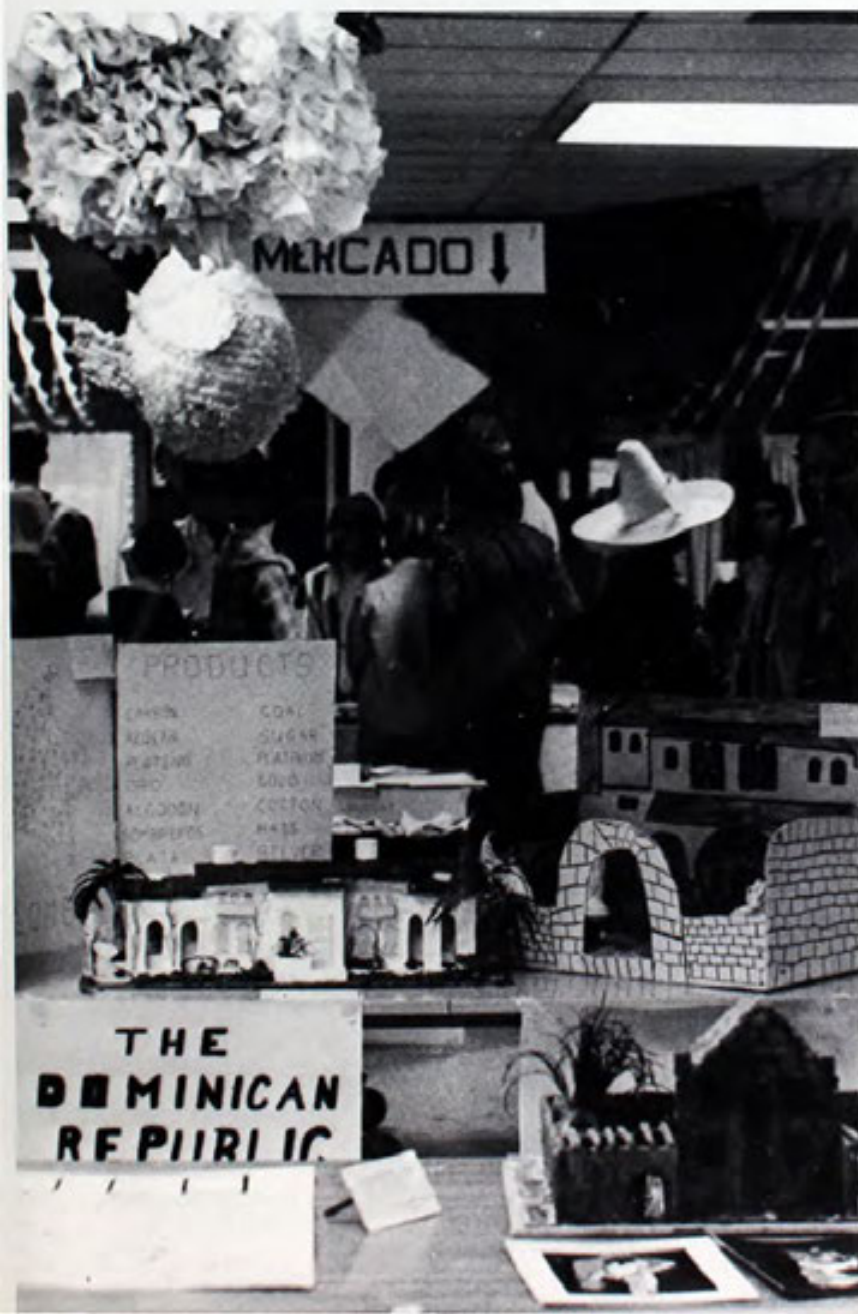

# Senior Health: What to Do in an Emergency?

Senior in the health classes concentrated mainly on procedures to be taken in emergency situations. Emphasis was placed on protection from radio-active fall-out and life in the fall-out shelter. Students learned the correct methods of bandaging wounds, emergency artificial respiration, and closed chest heart massage. A trip to Massillon State Hospital in the spring enlightened students as to the problems of the mentally ill. Upon successful completion of the course, students received national medical self-help certificates.

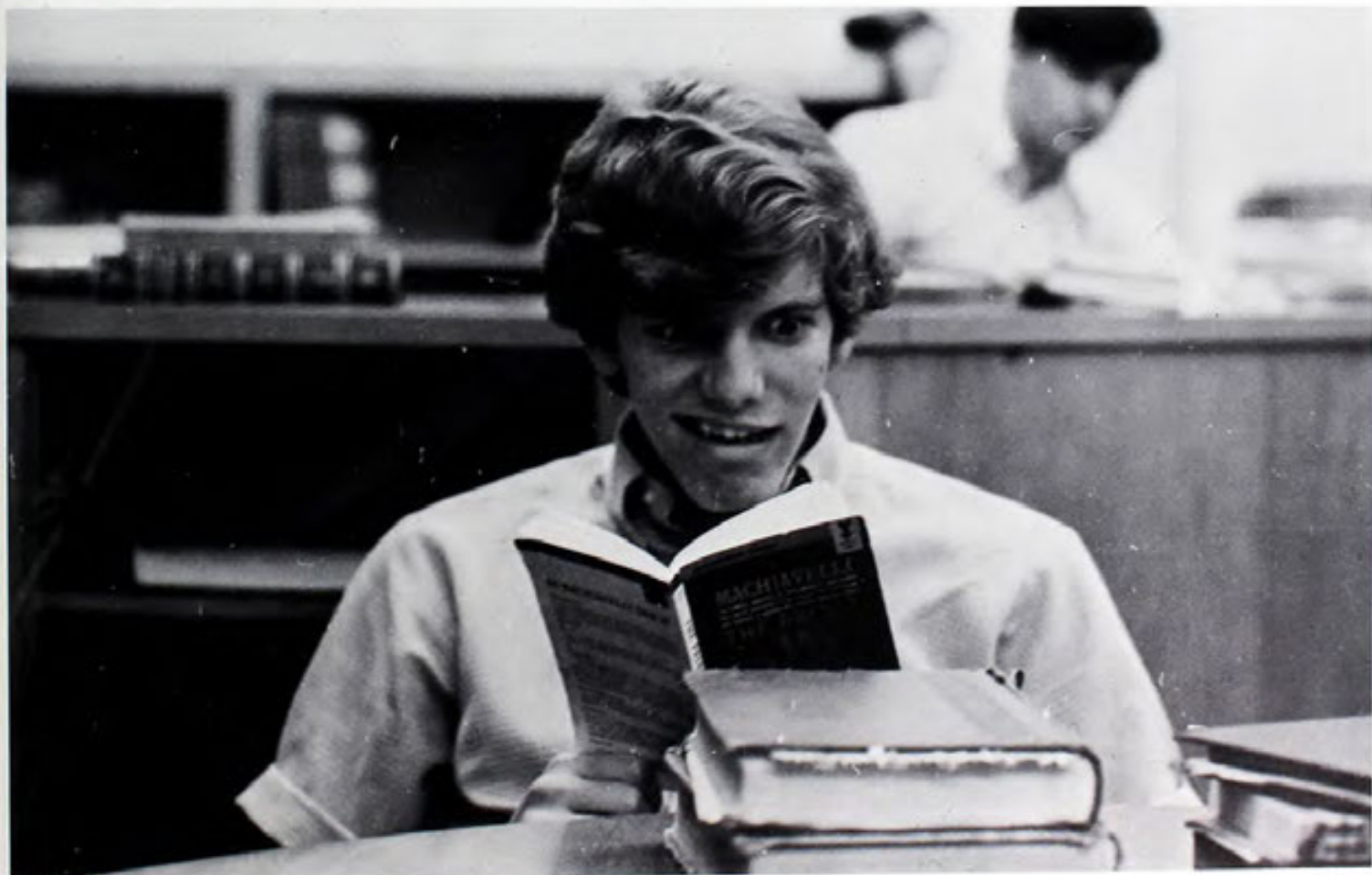

# Scientific Discoveries Evolved Through Tours

True scientific investigation was developed both in the lab and in the field under the guidance of Mrs. Wood, Mr. Bellville, and Mr. Stauffer. Field trips included visits to the Wooster Agricultural Experimental Station and Tuscora Park. The addition of student technicians and a room for experimentation also marked an increase in student interest.

Experimentation was thoroughly employed by all segments of the science department. Biology students researched the effects of hormones and conducted immunology studies on various animals. Through the individual study seminar, physics students rediscovered and investigated the laws that govern matter and energy.

The science fair was far more successful in 1969 than in recent years. Of those who earned the right to participate in the *Times-Reporter* Science Fair, Kathy Ball and Gwyn Schafley placed first and second in the field of botony.

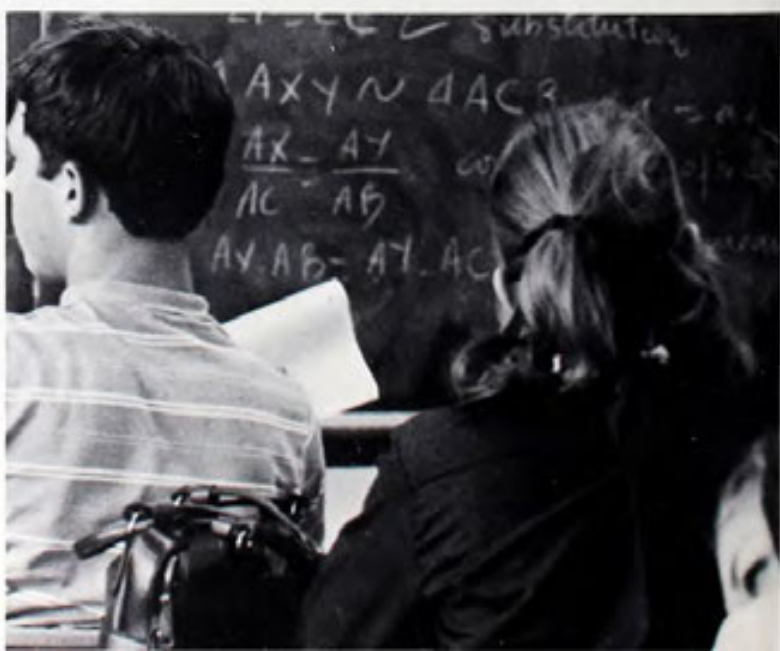

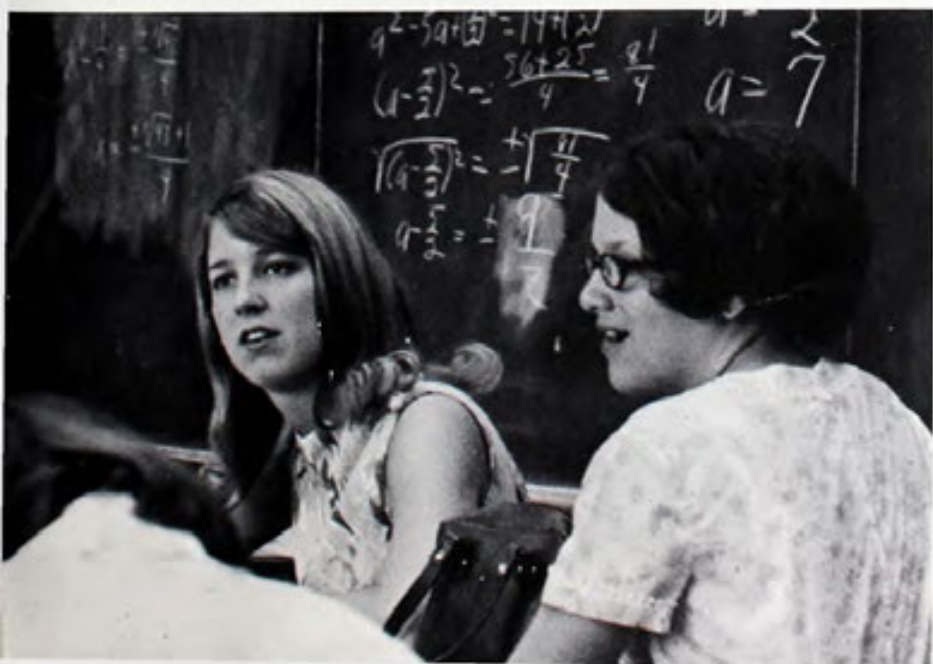

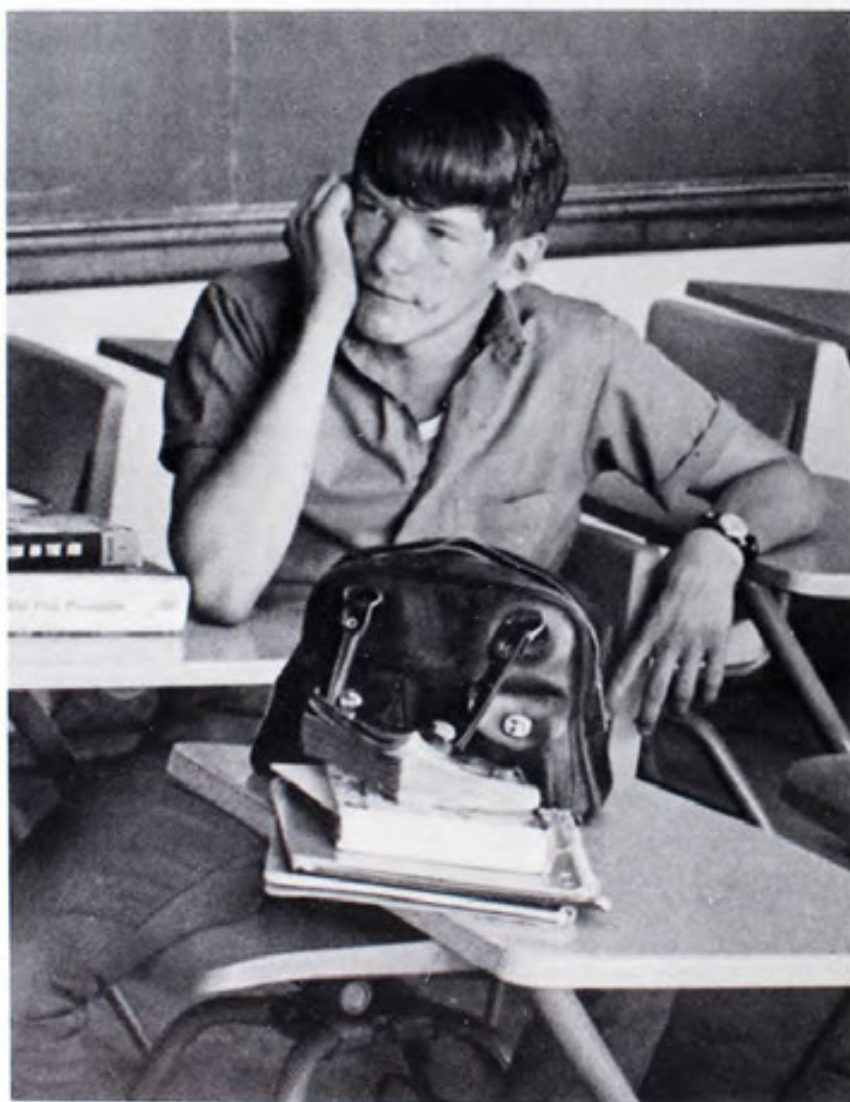


# Special Ed Increases Opportunities for Job Placement

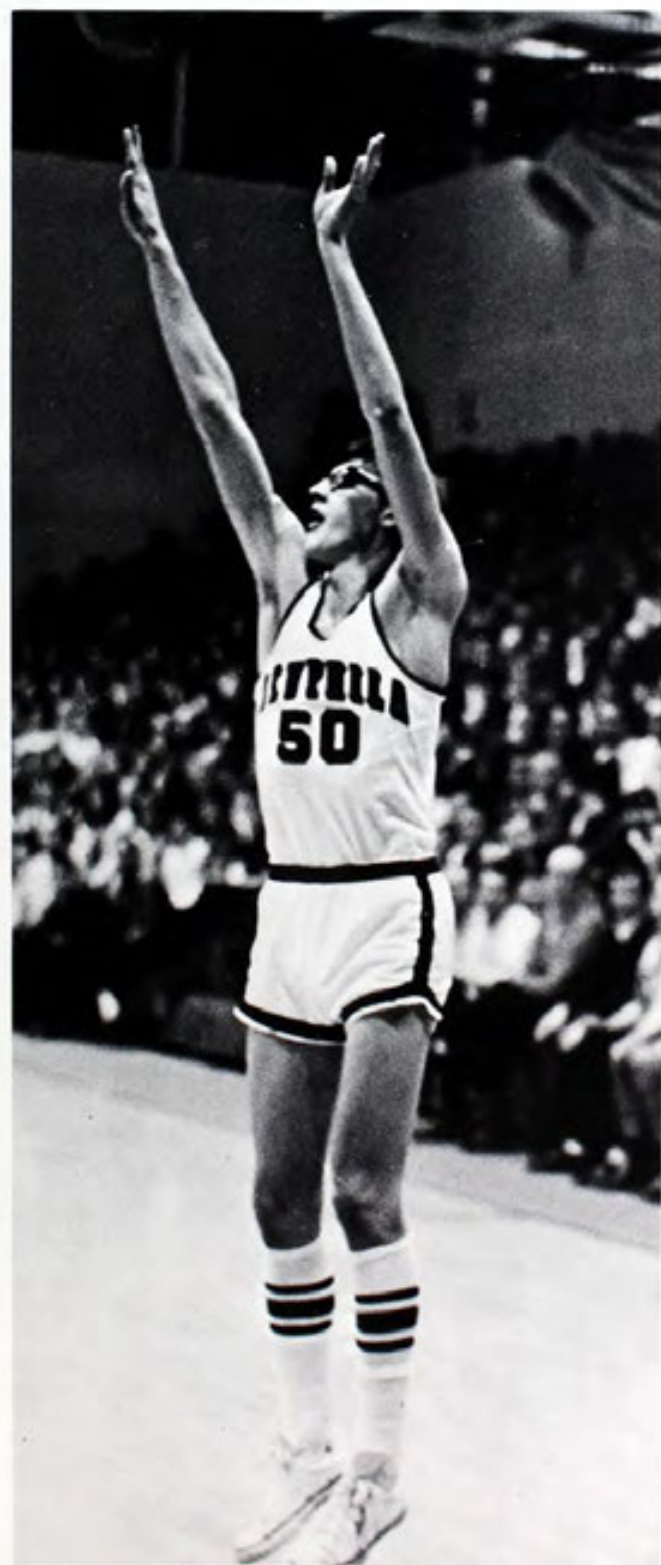

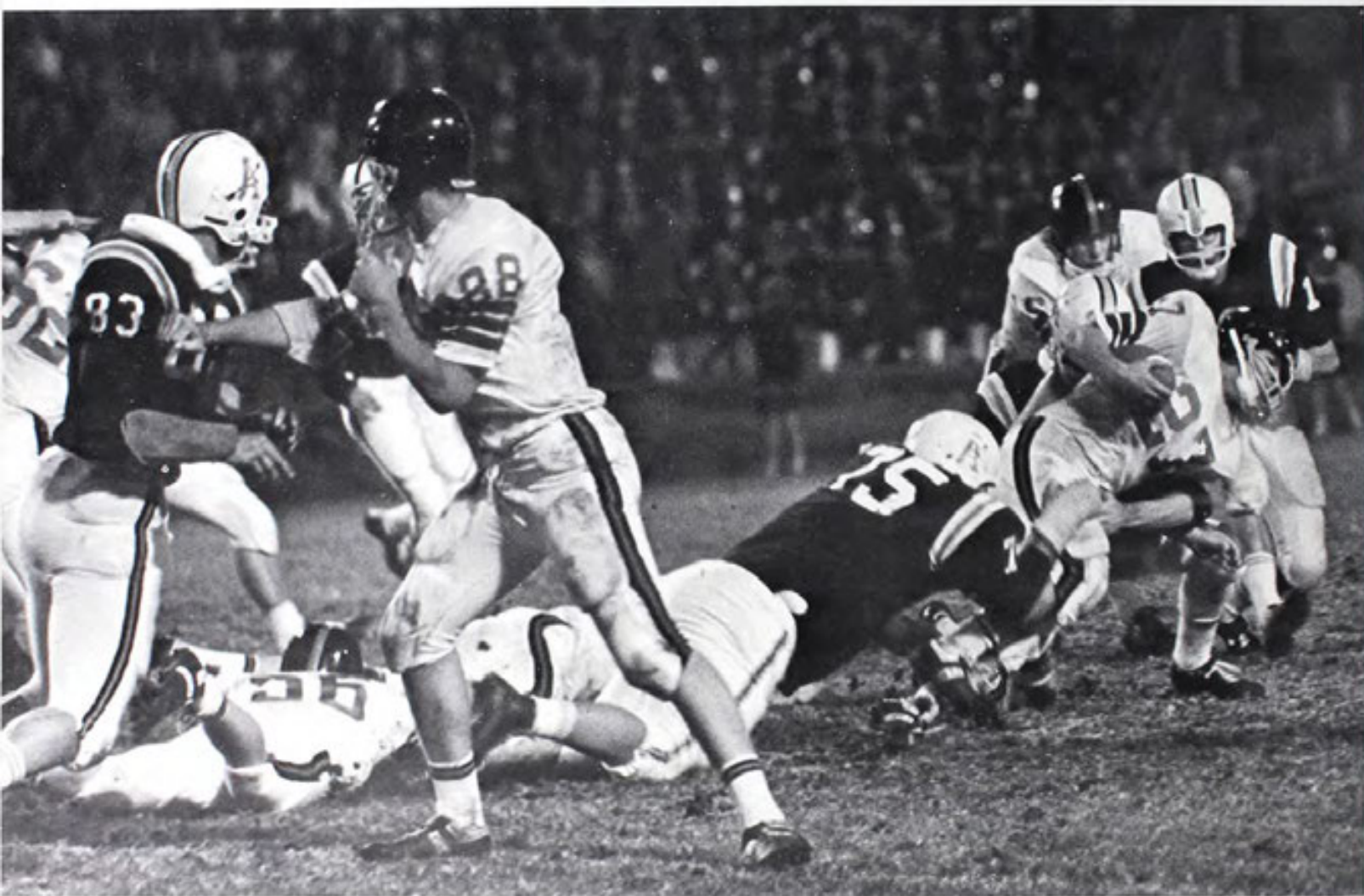




## Football 1968 — A Quaker Comeback

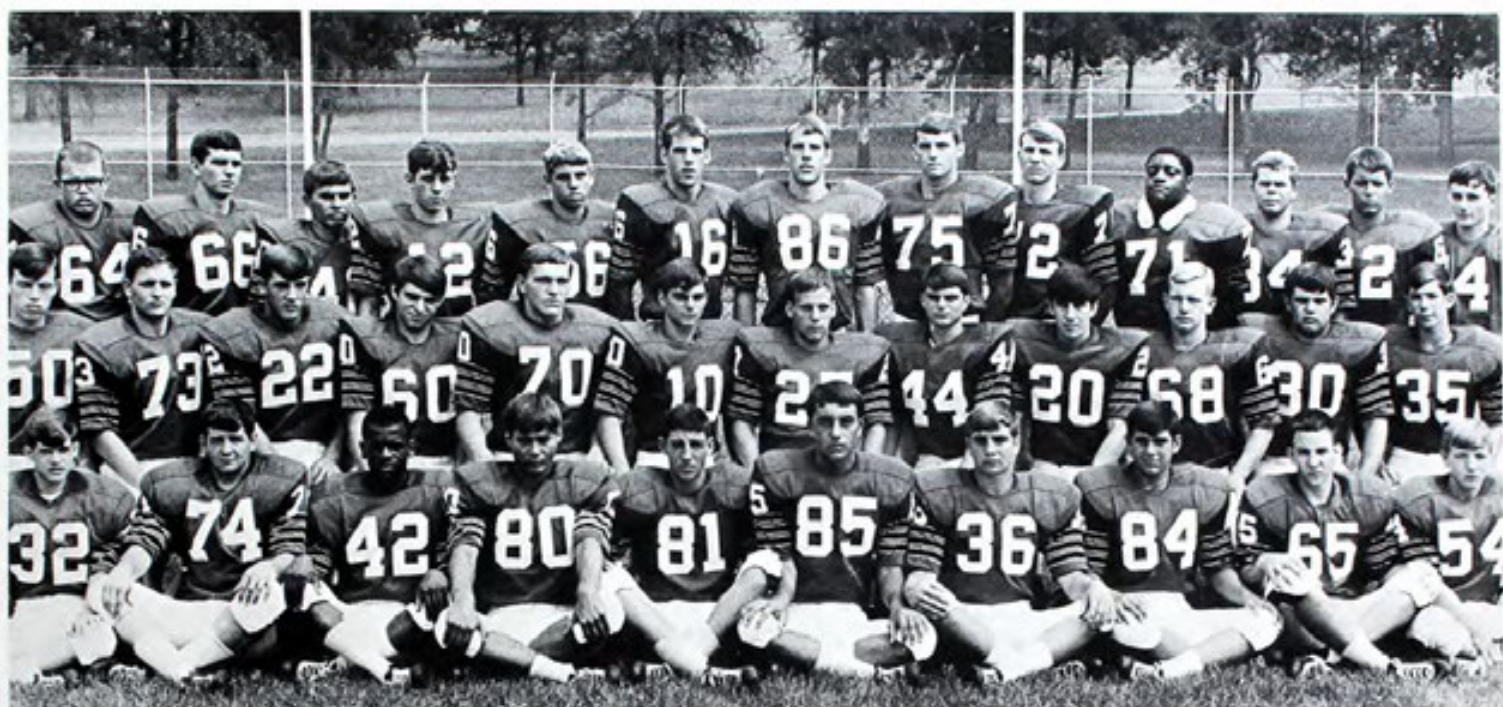

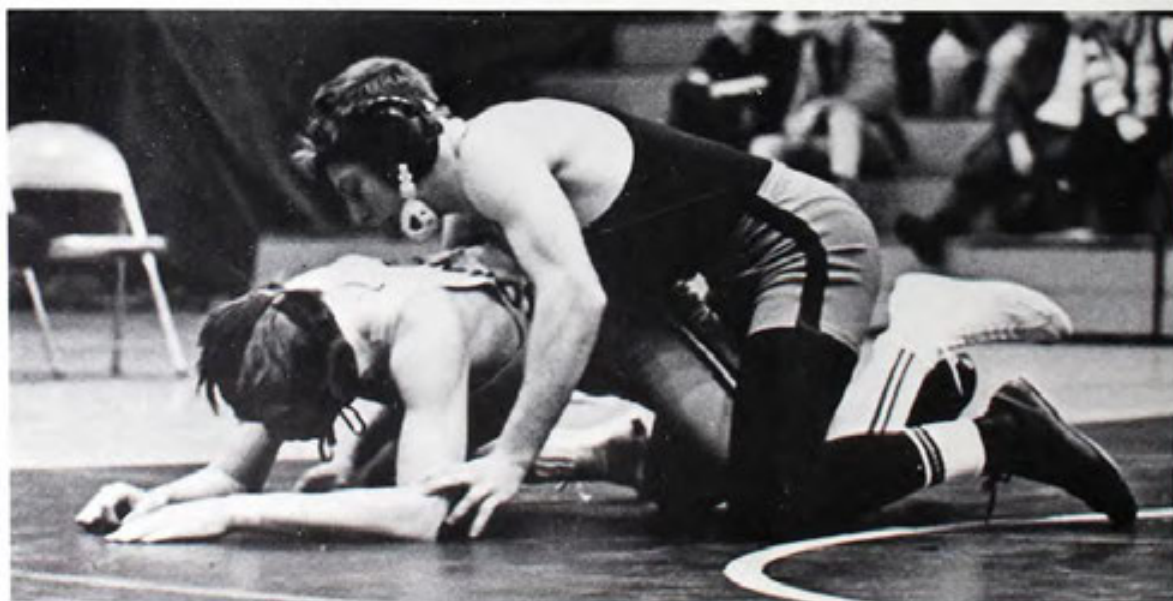

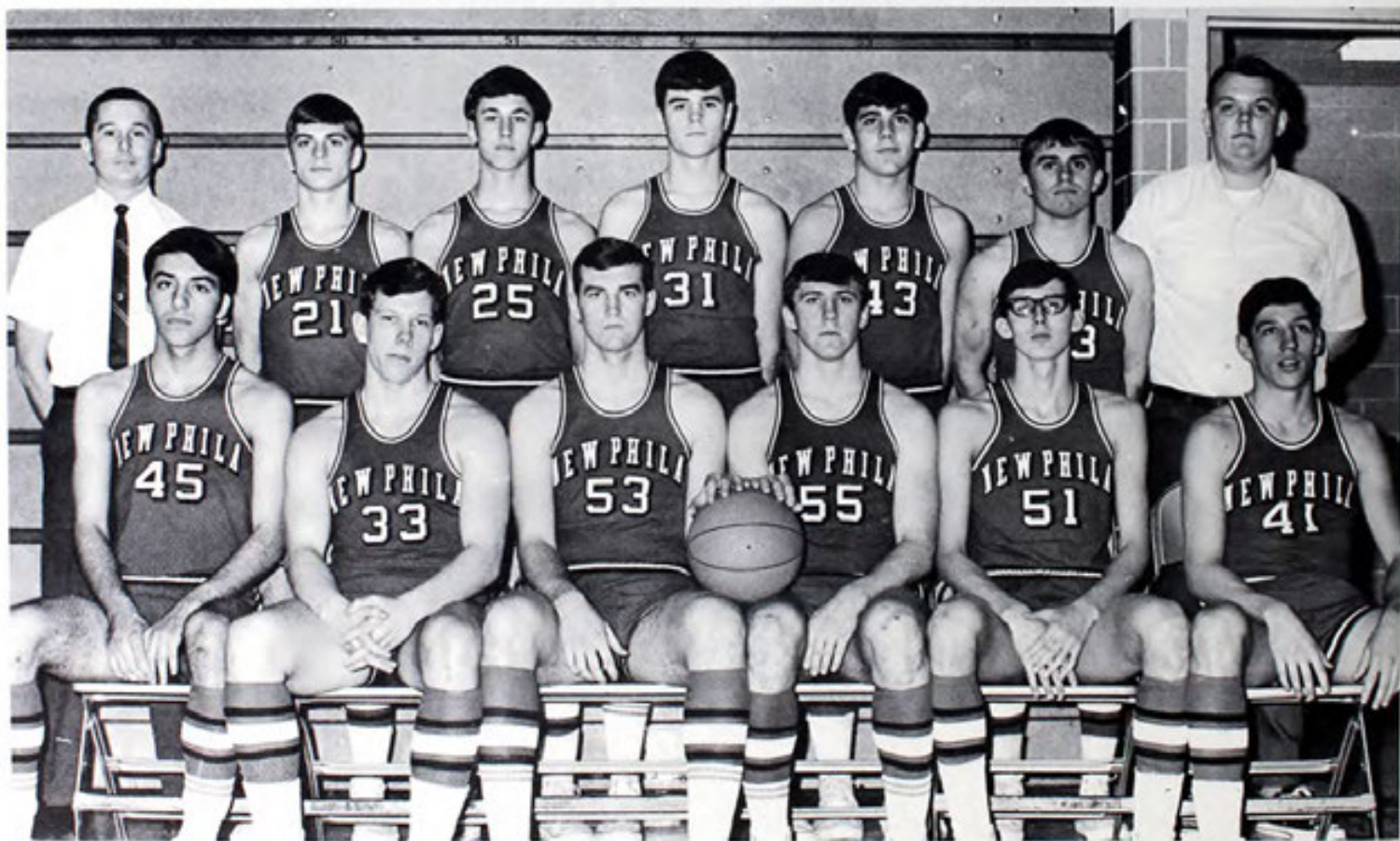

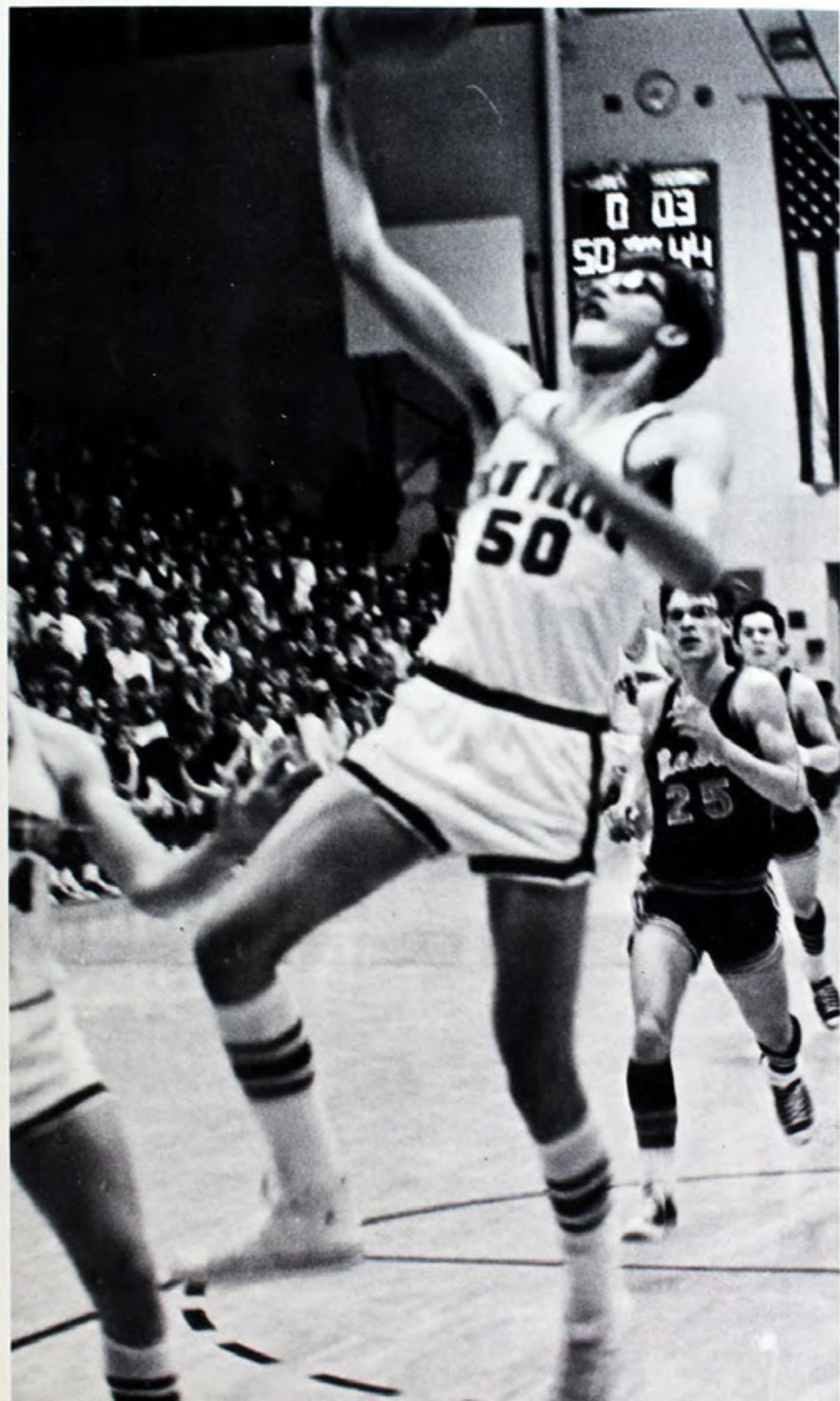

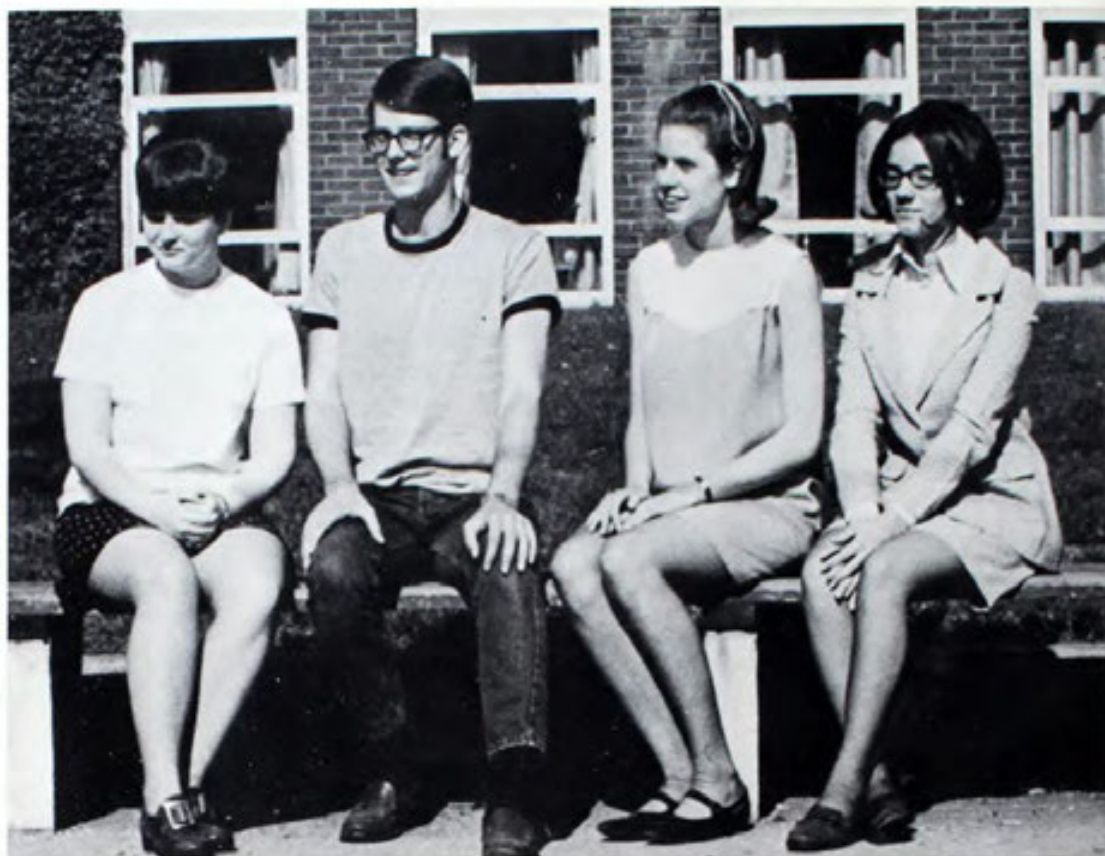

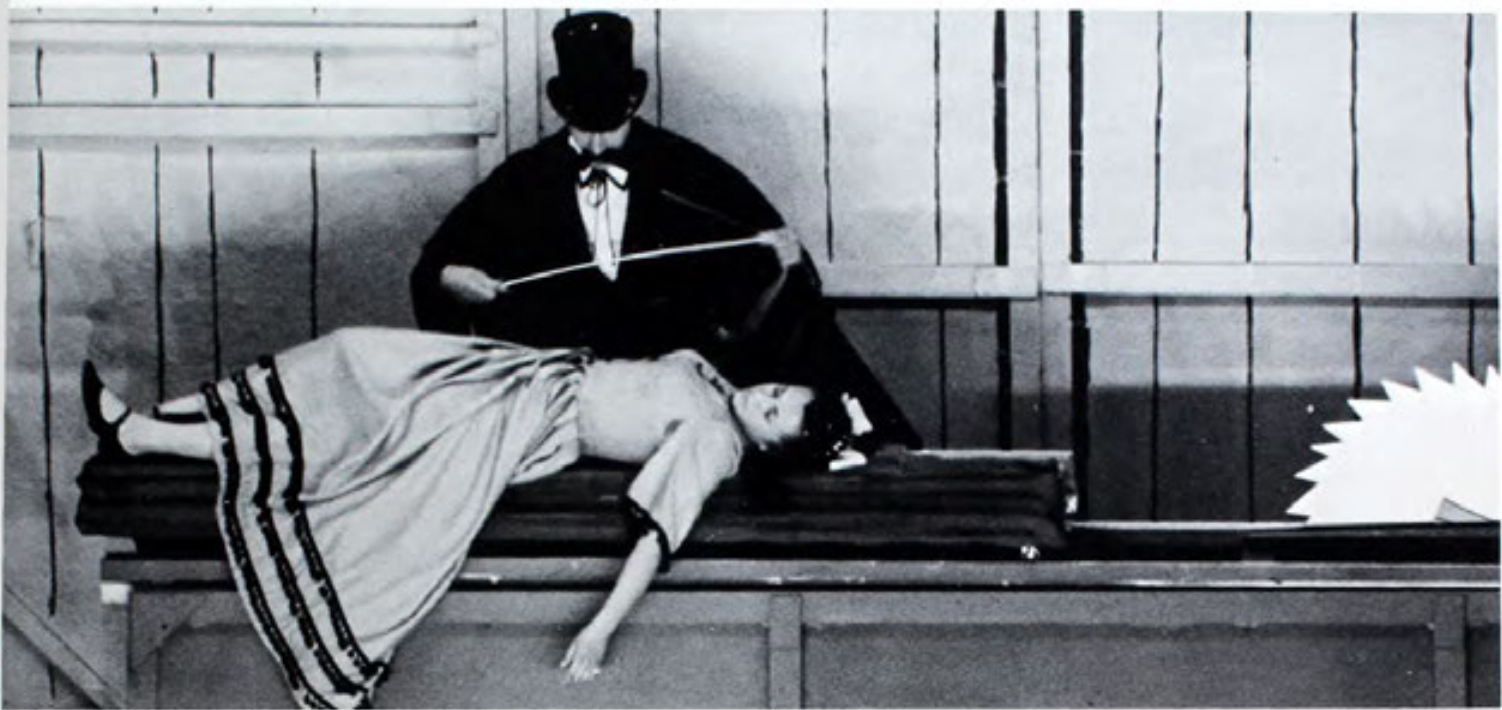

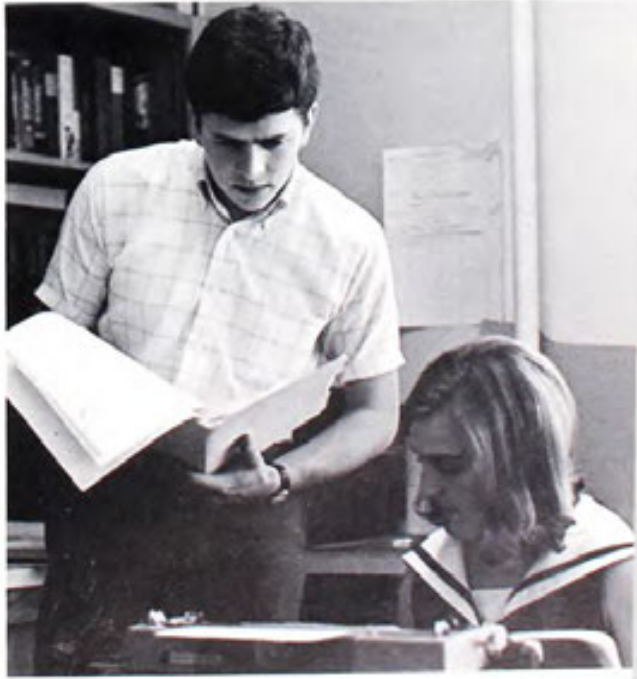
