Stumbling along without much luck in the early part of the season the Quaker football team shifted into high gear and rose to the occasion of playing sound football. Coach Jim Roman's key changes in personnel resulted in a new look and the turnaround was felt immediately as the Red and Black roared back from the brink to upset favored Cardinal Conference foe Wooster 7-3 on a late touchdown. The fifth game of the season seemed a duplication of the week before as the Quakers edged top ranked Columbus DeSales 10-7, the winning field goal slipping through the uprights with time running out. The second half of the schedule was improvement in all phases as New Phila began to gell frequently and enjoyed continuing success. Exploding offensively against Ashland and Coshocton put Phila in the right frame of mind for the grand finale against the Crimson and Gray. The Quakers, who showed the community and fans a new attitude from the beginning of practice in August, were in the hunt for the CC crown once again.

Riding an emotional crest throughout the first half, the charged up Quakers bottled up the Tornado attack and held their ground. But in the second half the Quakers could not move the ball, leading to a destructive $14-0$ defeat. The loss put the seasonal mark at 4-5-1, which included a tough loss to state playoff king Canton McKinley. Again the Red and Black displayed a guttsiness typical of the 1981 team.

Senior Rick Leggett remained a bright spot in all areas of the game throughout the season, winning the DeSales game with his clutch field goal. He was named top back. Senior Ed Conklin, Bill Kidd Award winner for 1981, showed vast improvement and was the solid anchor of the line. ## NEW STADIUM COMPLEX ADDS DIMENSION

After nearly two years of planning, fundraising, and hard work, a dream became a reality on March 29. 1982, when the Quaker Club officially presented its Quaker Stadium complex to the New Philadelphia Board of Education at a dedication ceremony in Quaker Stadium. This project will benefit athletes at NPHS for many years.

In September of 1980 the Quaker Club approved undertaking the $\$ 415.000$ project. Ground was broken July 4, 1981, during the First Town Days Festival and construction started on August 3 of the same year.

A contribution from the Timken Foundation was extremely important to the fi nancial success of the project. Other contributors included the Reeves Foundation and Fraser Foundation as well as many contributions from individuals and companies. The building was designed by

Knapp, and Crawfis Association and major construction coordinators were, general construction - Gundy Construe tion. plumbing construction - Peterman Plumbing and Heating, sprinkler system - Plumbing Contractors and Supply. H.V.A.C. - Sheetmetal Crafters, Inc., and electrical construction - Horn Electric.

The 9.500 square foot complex is located in the southeast corner of Quaker Stadium . It includes locker room facilities for our athletic events as well as a concession stand. It was first used in the spring of 1982 by the baseball, tennis, and track teams. The football team will enjoy the new locker rooms and weight room during the 1982 football season.

The public was given the opportunity to tour the locker room complex after the dedication ceremony, where Randy Fox
of W JER was master of ceremonies. Oth ers taking part in the ceremony were Le Benjamin, mayor of New Philadelphia an former teacher and coach at NPHS; Ricl ard Gummere, superintendent of Ne Philadelphia City Schools who accepte the keys to the completed project fro Butch Goudy, Quaker Club presiden Jack Wyrie and Larry Murphy, co-chai men of the project, recognized many pe ple and companies that made the comple possible, and special guest Woody Haye former football coach at NPHS and Oh State University, made a surprise retu to Quaker Stadium for the dedication.
