## QUAKERS "WING-IT" TO 7-3 GRID SLATE RESERVES SEE ACTION IN COSHOCTON VARSITY GAME

New faces and new positions was the difference in the 1982 rendition of the Quaker iootball team. The most dramatic change was Head Coach Ward Holdsworth and his single-wing offense. Athough it was a new offense in the Philly football campaign, Coach Holdsworth had used it previously with success. Jim Watson and David Korns were varsity assistants - all three varsity coaches are NPHS alumni.

Canton Central Catholic was the first to invade Quaker Stadium. Although the young offense was putting the pieces in place, it was junior Jim Roman who kicked the field goal for the only points of the game as the defense held our opponents scoreless.

During the Cambridge game, the offense scored their first touchdown of the season on a 12 -yard run by senior Al Ledrich. Steve Watson scored on a run around the end. However, the Bobcats outscored the Red and Black, giving our team a 1-1 record.

Cleveland Collinwood's defense allowed the Quakers to score their season high of 30 points while our defense only gave up 6 points. Senior Chuck Walker played a great defensive game, while Ledrich completed the only pass of the game on a razzle-dazzle jump pass.

The Quakers opened the Cardinal Conference at Wooster. Ledrich gained 91 yards in 19 carries. The only Quaker touchdown came in the first half on a 44 -yard TD pass from Watson to junior Matt Dummermuth. The Bailey brothers - Blake and Chad, seniors Dave Milarcik, Eric Myers, and Brent Morgan, each played excellent defense. During the second half, the Generals, as well as penalities in key situations, spelled defeat for the spirited Quakers.

The Quakers quickly rebounded as they defeated Columbus 5 t. Francis Desales 14-6. Ledrich rushed 87 yards while his backfield partner, Watson gained 67 yards.



After six games, NP football had a 4-2 record as the Quakers upset a tough Mansfield Madison team 28-8. Our gridders gained over 200 yards on the ground with many Quakers playing an outstanding Homecoming Game.

Ashland found that the Quaker offense liked to put points on the board, as we scored four touchdowns and four extra points to the Arrows two TD's. Watson had a career high of 174 yards rushing and seniors loe Lowery and Chad Bailey each had interceptions. Senior Jay Yanders played an excellent game at center as the ground was wet but he never fumbled.

As the Quakers entered Mustang territory, spirit was high and the 21-0 victory was pleasant. Early in the second quarter, Watson scored on a 37 -yard run. After a Dummermuth interception, Ledrich rolled over from the 1-yard line for the second TD of the game. Lowery ran 64 yards for the last touchdown and the game high of 111 yards. Milarcik. Troy Pallotto, and Todd McClung all had a great game.

The Quakers made it a five-game winning streak as they downed Coshocton. With a 29-0 lead, Philly substituted freely and many JV's had an opportunity to play in a varsity game.

The outstanding Quaker defense stuffed Dover many times when they were in Quaker territory. Lowery scored on a 40 yard TD strike from Watson. Jim Roman who had had an outstanding kicking game all season, kicked the extra point as well as a field goal. Dummermuth had a fine punting game. The Quakers ended the season with a tough three point loss to its arch-rival. The single-wing offense, which had been well executed by the Quakers, combined with an outstanding defense to give the Red and Black a respectible $7-3$ record.

## FIRST GAME FORECASTS SEASON

Carrollton invaded Quaker territory twice during the 1982-83 basketball season. On their first visit the Warriors defeated the home team, a feat accomplished by our opponents on many occassions as we ended the season with a 6-15 record. However, the Red and Black rose to the occassion in the season finale, as they played NBA style basketball and smothered visiting Carrollton, 103-81.

Seniors joe Taralla, who was the third-highest scorer the 1981-82 season, Chuck Walker, and Dennis Harding were the only lettermen who greeted Coach Jim Thompson for the 1982-83 season. The eight-year cage boss, during pre-season, summed up the team as the smallest he had ever had at NPHS but also the most agressive and competitive. Jim Wherley was varsity assistant while Rick Sattler took over the reserve helm.

With already an up-and-down season, the Quakers had the sweet taste of victory on December 17 as they downed arch-rival Dover 59-52. Shooting 46 percent from the field, the Quakers were led by Taralla with 19 points. He also pulled down nine rebounds. The younger members of the team were very much a part of the victory as junior Mark Fisher and sophomore Vince Miccichi joined in double figures with 14 and 11 points, respectively. Walker played strong defense and added seven rebounds and seven points.

In an upset over Ashland, Phila played an excellent defensive game and had an impressive 53 percent shooting performance. Aided by 14 points from two players off the bench, the Red and Black sparked a 57-42 demise of Ashland. Doug Gibbs with 8 points and Mike Cerett, who chipped in six points, were the bench strength needed to down the visiting Arrows. Mike Demattio, Mike Paris, and Harding turned in some crucial defensive plays. Taralla showed his usual board strength with 12 rebounds.

After a last second play at Wooster, the Quakers were tied for the CC leadership with a league record of 3-1. Although they had never lead during the game, the final buzzer gave the Quakers a stunning $56-55$ victory over Wooster on lanuary 7. Our other victories were over Columbus Franklin Heights and East Liverpool. The Quakers bowed out of tournament play their first game as they lost to Zanesville.

Our record was not indicative of the intensity with which the roundballers played this year as they provided excitment for the fans. Although small in height, they were deep in determination as was exemplified by their foul shooting, ball handling. fine defensive plays, and rebounding.
