




THIS IS LIVING AT NPHS





Ignites Holiday Spirit



FROM RETTON TO LEWIS, WE SHOWED THE WORLD OUR ATHLETIC EXCELLENCE

If one were to think of three words to describe the USA's participation in the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles, they might be dominating, touching, and triumphant. 1984 saw different names and different faces, but the results were none-the-less pleasing. Fans watched on as the USA dominated such sports as basketball and track, and leaped to the foreground in gymnastics.

If ever two words described the USA's effort in basketball, they would have to be Michael Jordan. Jordan and the USA spread, under coach Bobby Knight of Indiana U., ripped opponents with a devastatingly balanced offense and a "flesh-n-blood" defense, which combined to destroy opponents by an average of 39 points. The same "killer"





instinct was displayed by the woman's team, led by coach Pat Head Summit, as they zapped opponents by an average of 30 points. The name Cheryll Miller stuck out as she led in most of the categories for the USA Woman's team.

Another event that Americans dominated was track and field. For the men, names like Carl Lewis and Edwin Moses stuck out. Lewis reached the gold in four events, which tied Jesse Owens' record of 4 golds in the Olympics. Just as incredible, Moses won his 90th consecutive victory in the 400m low hurdles. For the woman,

names like Joan Benoit a Valerie Brisco-Hooks took stage. Benoit soundly defined top ranked Grette Wait the woman's marathon, with Brisco-Hooks took 3 g medals in the sprint categ. These weren't the only nathat appeared for the US, they do symbolize the eff and accomplishments of all the athletes in the Olympics.

Four More Years For Reagan: Landslide Victory For GOP



It happened just like the students at N.P.H.S. predicted, a 59% to 41% victory for Ronald Reagan. In this victory, the people were saying that they wanted four more years of "Reaganomics," the plan which helped to lead the country out of depression, and, in some cases, into controversy. But for the candidates, the victory was as much a historical victory as a personal one.

Historically, this election was the first to have a female candidate running for a major party. This election set the standards for future elections in that it proved that a woman can be as aggressive in an election as a man. The woman was Geraldine Ferraro, and she went toe-to-toe with Vice-President George Bush in several debates, and also productively campaigned for the Mondale ticket. As Mondale was quoted as saying. "We are proud of her. (Ferraro) We didn't win, but we made history."

On the winning side of the elections, Reagan and Co. couldn't be happier. The President received 525 electoral votes, which was the highest total in history. Reagan accounted for 49 states, while Mondale won the District of Columbia and his home state of Minnesota. 
spirit ribbon, and Best Theme and Best Overall in the float competition.


Decorates School With Spirit


have the job of raising this year's record even higher.
