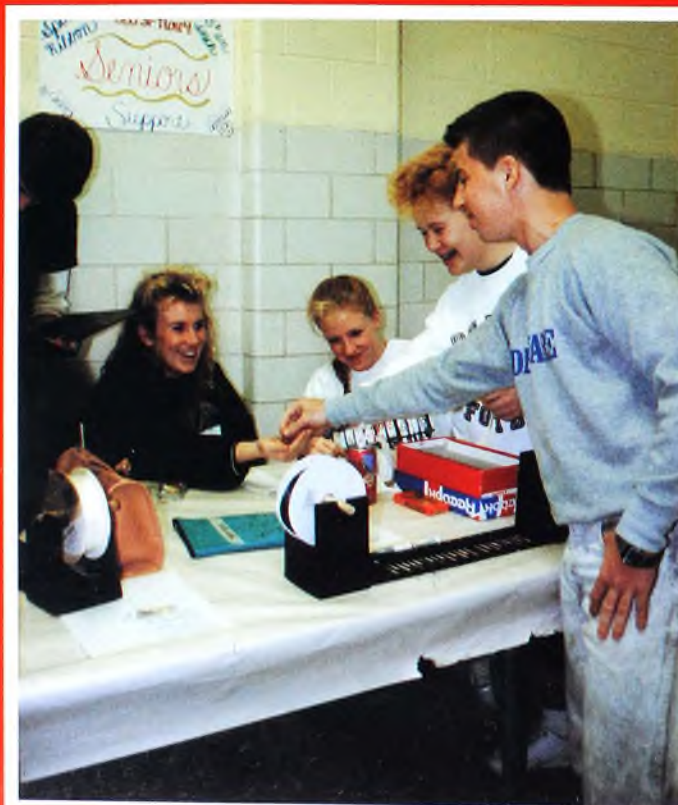

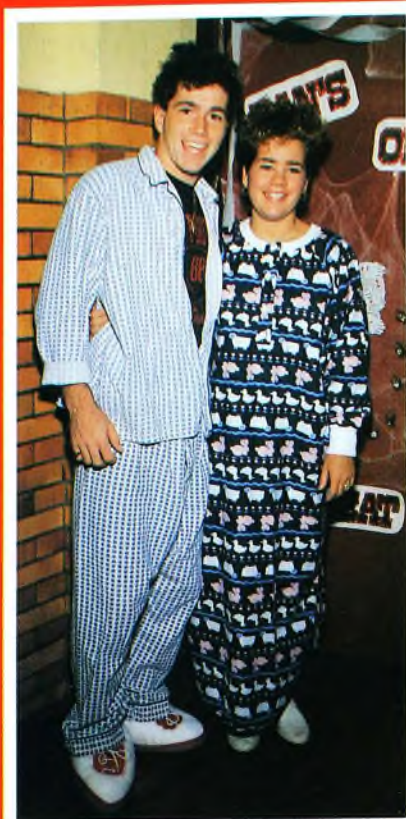

Beats DOVER 22-19

The Varsity Football Team got off to a good start in 1988 by taking a 7-0 win over Vincent Warren. The Quakers then took two consecutive losses, being beaten by Zanesville, 20-15, Cleveland Collinwood, with a score of 21-

Phila bounced back the next week with a 19-6 victory over Canton South. The next two games and the Quakers being beaten by Glen Oak Lake. The team didn't give up, and pulled together, winning three of their last four games.

Phila shut out Louisville, and Wooster, and took a 22-19 win over Dover.

This year's team was led by quarterbacks Denny Trimmer and Gabe Richmond, completing nearly fifty percent of their passes, with a total of 1,156 passing yards. Jan Walter and Shawn Gribble were the leading rushers with over four hundred yards each, while Dave Kinsey dominated the receiving end of the Quaker Team with 570 yards. Top Varsity scorers were Dave Kinsey and Shawn Gribble.

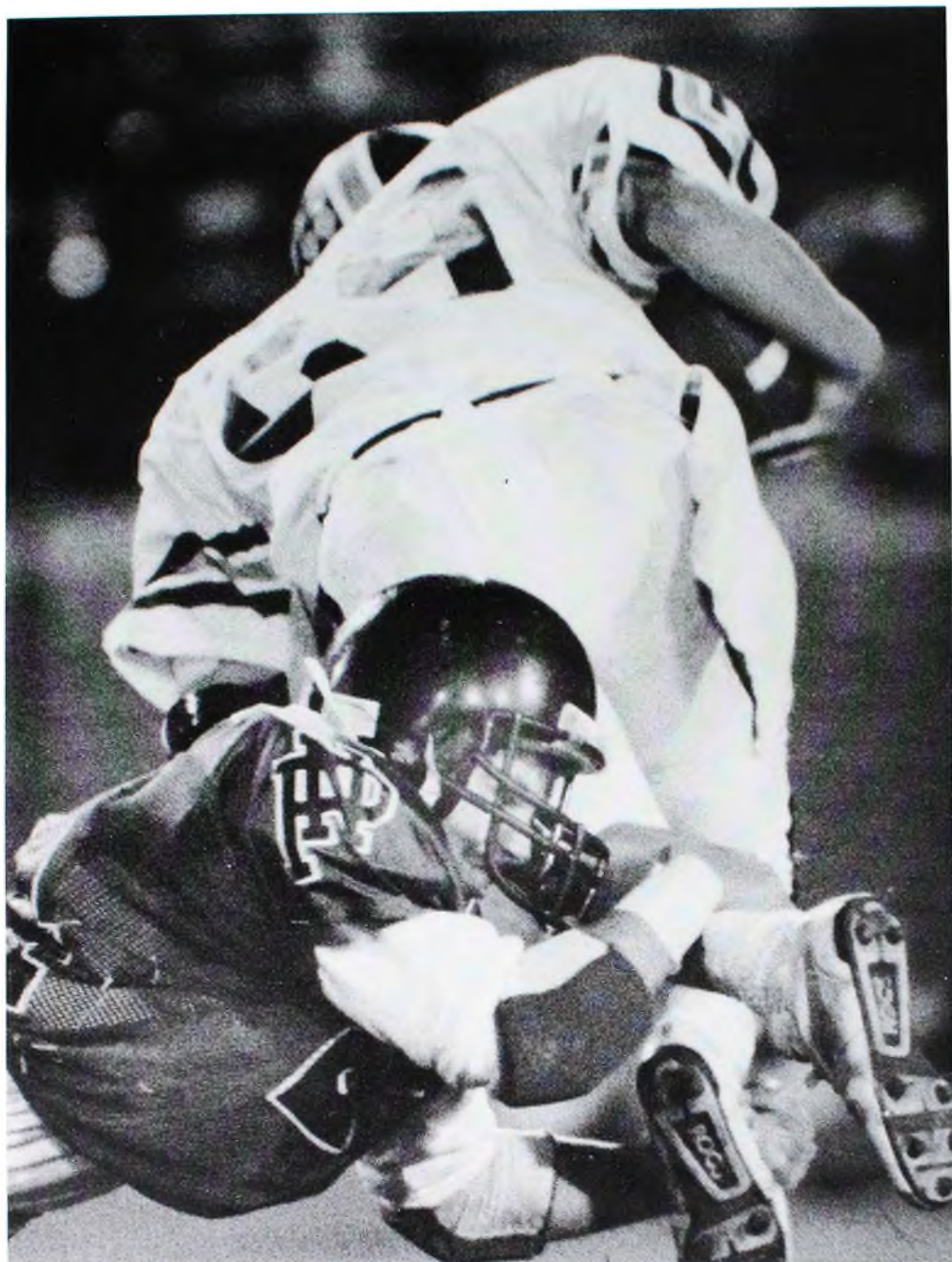

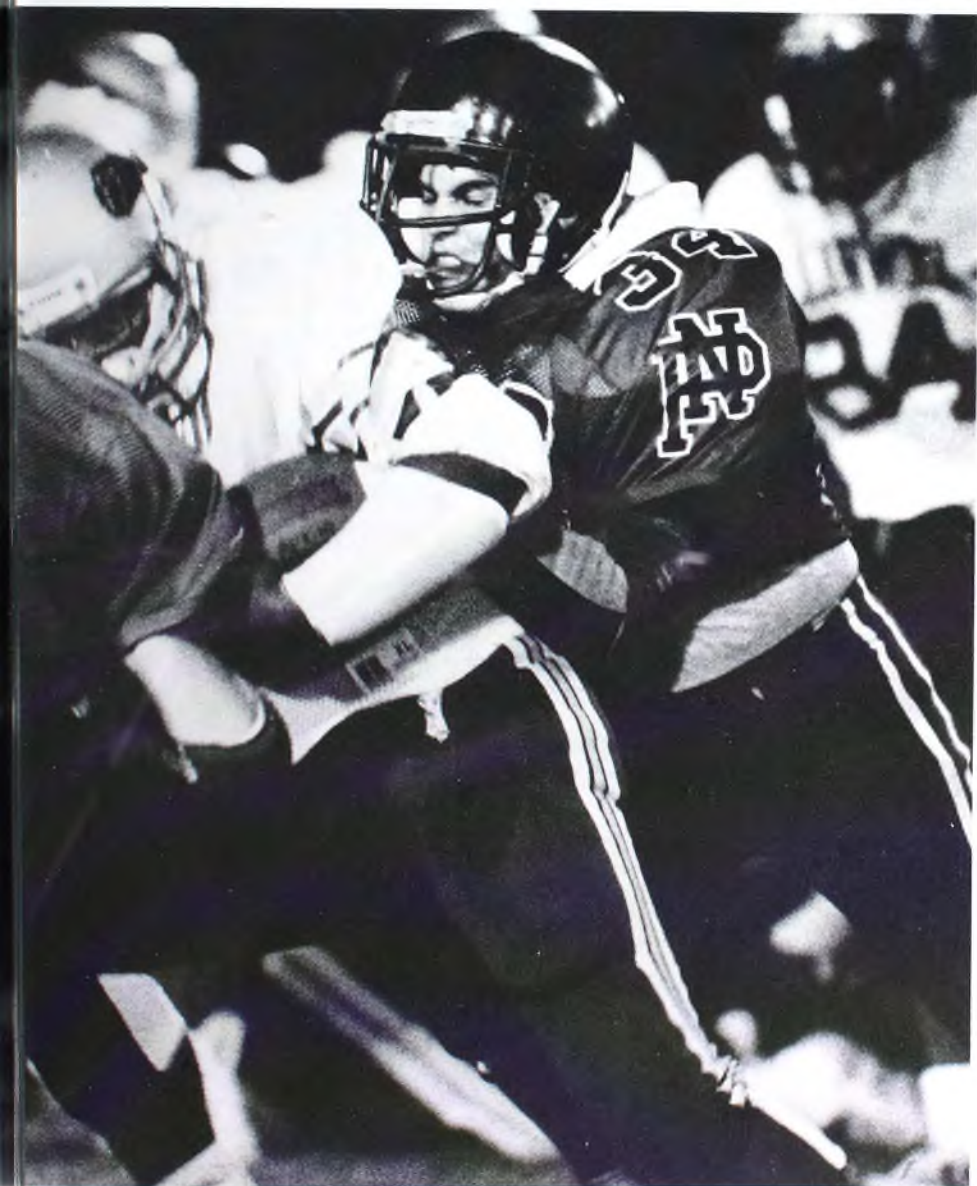

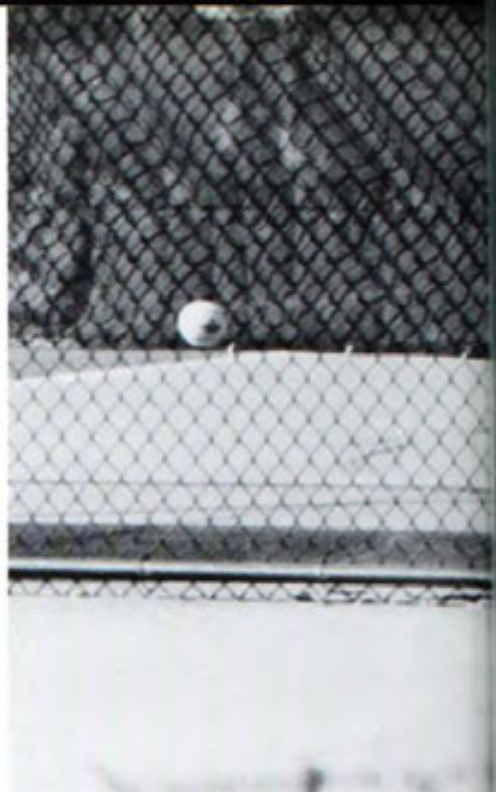
A Smashing Success

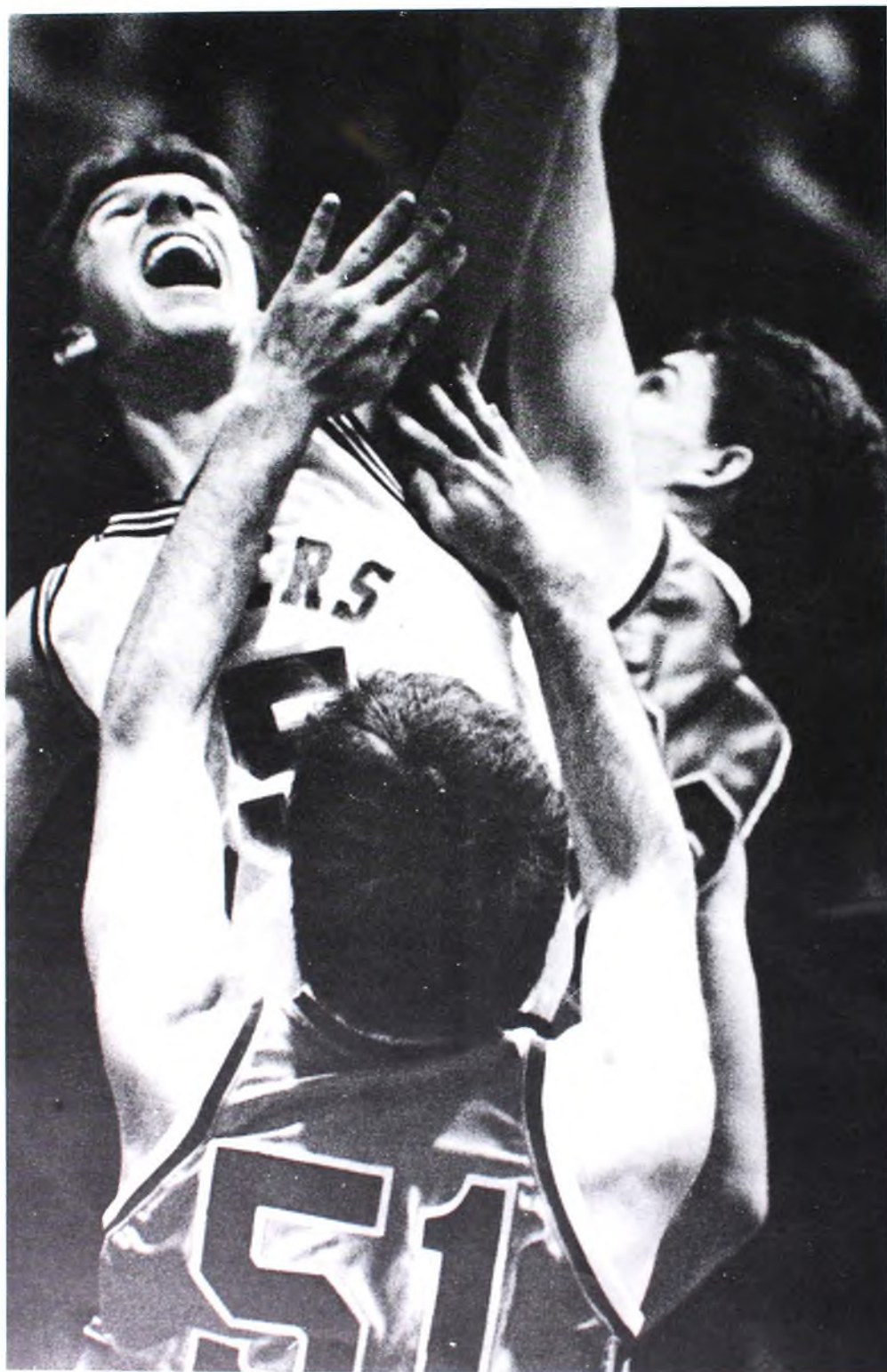

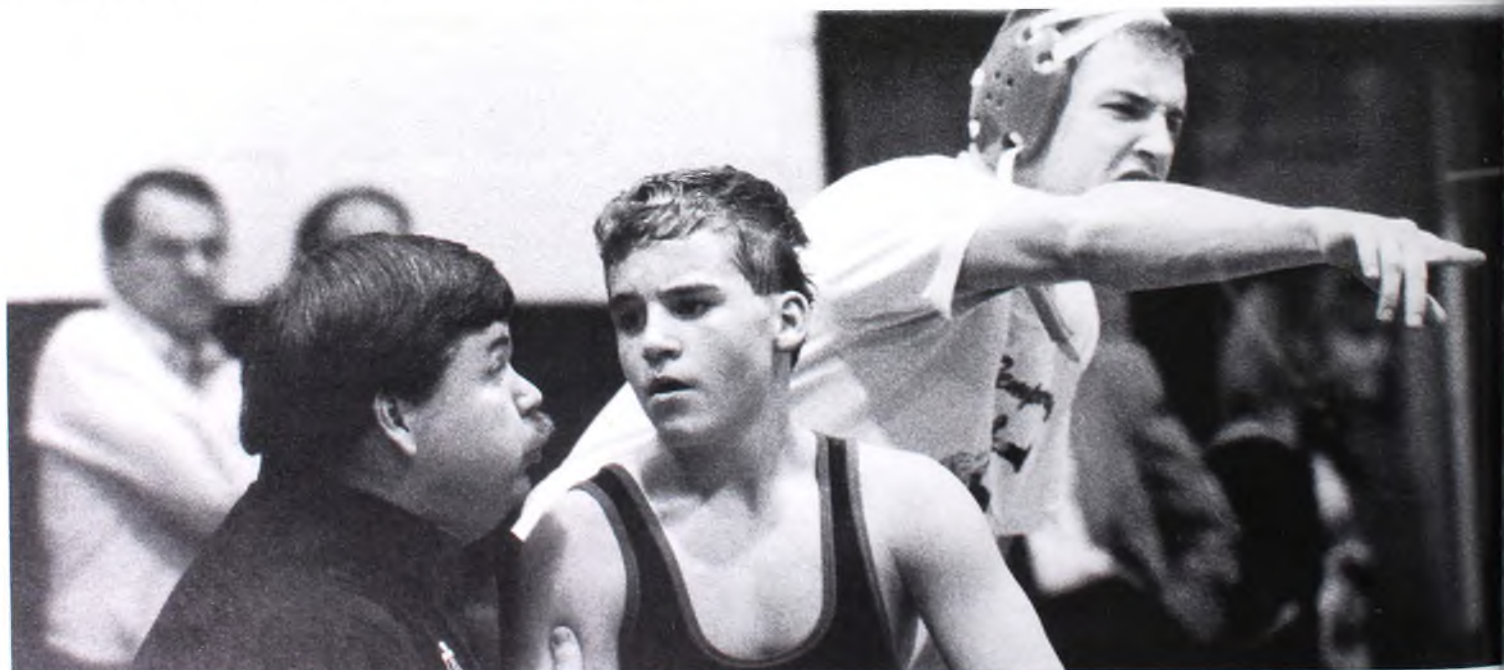
4 Qualify for State

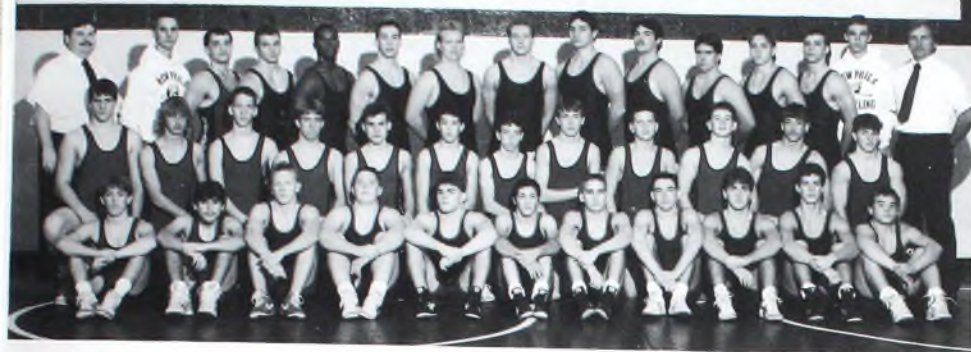

During a press conference held at The Times Reporter on October 29, 1985, plans for a forty-five million dollar enclosed shopping mall on New Philadelphia's southside were announced by Governor Richard Celeste. Accompanying the governor to the press conference were developers Herbert and David Glimcher, from the Glimcher Co. of Columbus, Ohio. The new mall was planned to hold between seventy and ninety stores and create up to 2000 new jobs. The new mall will also have a family entertainment center, food court, and several kiosks. A kiosk is a small structure open at one or more sides in the center of the floor, such as a kiosk. There is also planned a ten screen, 100 seat theatre to open in summer 1989. In order to begin work on the new mall, access routes to the mall and a bridge over the Tuscarawas River from I-76 Ave. must be built. Hicks & associates engineering firm of New Philadelphia were contracted to develop plans for these improvements. Next, Hosking Construction Co. of Fredricktown was contracted to carry

out these plans and Retenbach Constructors Inc. of Knoxville, Tennessee were contracted to build the mall shortly after.

With its blessing from the Tuscarawas County Regional Planning Commission, some minor objections from TAPS (Taxpayers Against Public Subsidies) and the official ending of the 1986 "mall wars", a groundbreaking ceremony went as planned, despite an anonymous call threatening violence. Attending the ceremony were over 100 state, county and local officials, as well as representatives from the Glimcher Co. and some law enforcement officers. Work on the new mall was underway on April 28, 1987 when preliminary construction by Ben Cookson Inc. started doing fill, retention and floodway work on the 60-acre site. Soon after, all four anchor stores were confirmed, Hills, JCPenney Co., Elder-Beerman and Sears.

Finally the big day was drawing near and the entire mall would soon be open, and to celebrate this occasion, a fifty dollar per person benefit ball was to be held on Oct 19. The

benefit was a huge success with over 600 people in attendance. The big day was here, Oct. 20, 1988, and it all began with a 9:15 am ribbon cutting ceremony. It was all underway, a ten day grand opening celebration with Mi-

chael Stanley and Donny Iris and the Cruisers. There were many contests, such as a \$2,000.00 shopping spree and a ball drop with over 100 prizes including an eight day Caribbean cruise for two. Also, there were

sales in every store and balloons galore. All in all, it was a terrific grand opening, with thousands of people flooding every store, knowing that New Towne Mall will be an everlasting success!

Bush Wins; Dukakis Not Even Close

The national general election for President of the United States was held on November 8, 1988. In a landslide victory, Vice-President George Bush won over Governor Mike Dukakis by about 40 states. Vice-President Bush also won in the electoral college by about 186 votes. Bush will be taking over the Presidency from Ronald Reagan in January, 1989.

In the weeks before the election, Dukakis whipped out his mud sling and started shooting. He accused George Bush of being a wimp, arrogant, and a conservative. But, president-elect Bush had called Governor Dukakis a liberal (the L-word), old softie, abortionist, and cheapskate.

This was one of the worst mud-slinging campaigns in history.

On a cleaner note, 76% of the New Phila. High School student body turned out to vote in our school's mock election which was organized by Mr. Miller and his history students. 68% voted for George Bush, about 20% less than the national level. Only 32% voted for Michael Dukakis. In addition to the presidential voting, students also voted for State Senator, and for the issues of open lunch and R.R.A. (revised room assignment). In the race for State Senator, Howard Metzenbaum won 54% to George Voinovich's 46%. The wording on the open lunch issue

was very tricky. It was used to make the voter think and read the question very thoroughly. The question was worded like this, "Should the current policy of an open lunch period at N.P.H.S. not be repealed?" Some people who voted didn't catch this and they voted "no". But most got the question right. 70% got it right while 30% missed the point. The last question on the ballot was if R.R.A. was an effective means of punishment. "no" was the resounding answer by a 57% vote for no and a 43% vote for yes. The percentage of student voters was about the same as the national level with the same results.

Space Shuttle Launch

You Were Perfect

On Thursday, September 29, 1988, at exactly 11:37 AM, the 26th space shuttle mission had begun. The spaceship named the Discovery was launched from Cape Canaveral, Florida. The five astronauts were all very nervous and greatly anticipating this wonderful experience. They were Richard Covey, David Hilmer, George Nelson, Mike Lounge, and Rick Hauck. In preparation

for the flight each system was checked and rechecked and tested many times to prevent any unfortunate mishaps. They had to be very careful to avoid another accident like the Challenger. The liftoff was perfect and the Discovery and its crew was then in orbit 184 miles from the earth. The commander, Frederick H. Hauck, told Mission Control, "We're looking forward to the next four

days - we have a lot to do and we're going to have a lot of fun doing it." The next four days were very busy, as there were many things to be done. The major goals were to deploy a \$100 million Tracking and Data Relay, to be used to communicate with orbiting shuttles and other spacecraft; also they had to check more than 400 modifications made to shuttle systems since Challenger, and conduct eleven scienti-

fic and technological experiments. They returned back to earth at 9:37 AM, on October 3, at Edwards Air Force Base, California. The mission was nearly flawless. NASA is aiming to increase its launch schedule to fourteen flights per year by 1993, which is the same year it hopes to begin building a space station.

Skateboarding, a sport that many people are beginning to enjoy has been around for many years.

At first skateboards attracted older teenagers, but today many kids ten years old and under spend their spare time on boards, which cost over a hundred dollars each.

In the 1960's, surfers would skateboard on days when there was no surf. They wanted the feeling on land they got while surfing. The first skateboards were merely 2' by 4' with rollerskate wheels.

During the 1970's, skateboarding improved dramatically. Bet-

ter wheels were developed in 1975 and new moves were invented; 360's, kickflips, and handstands were a few of the first tricks skaters perfected, and "Skateboarder" magazine was first published.

1976 marked the year of the skateparks. Swimming pools were drained and used as places to skate, yet skaters were still looking for bigger and better thrills.

By 1978, Skateboards became wider and more color was added. Difficult tricks were developed; handplants, ollies, and slides. Skaters used streets and curbs for

practice.

But in 1980, things changed. Skateparks were shutting down. Even the "Skateboarder" magazine went out of print. The skateboarding fad seemed to be over.

In 1981 however, ramps popped up: Skater's were back!! Skateboard parks went back into business, this time stronger than ever before.

1985, when street skating was at a high point, many cities made it illegal. Dover, Ohio was one of these cities.

Kids from all over Tuscarawas county approached Dover City Counsel asking for a

county ramp. The counsel declined their request.

In New Philadelphia, when neighbors complained about noise, the city made Robert Wires take down the ramp he had allowed his son Kelly and other skater friends to build in his backyard.

George Houston, who chairs the zoning board, proposed building a ramp at Tuscora Park. If the park board approves, a ramp will be built in addition to the new pools, at the park for the use of all skateboards in Tuscarawas, Stark and Carroll counties.

Drained swimming pools are very popular places for skater's to have their practice sessions.

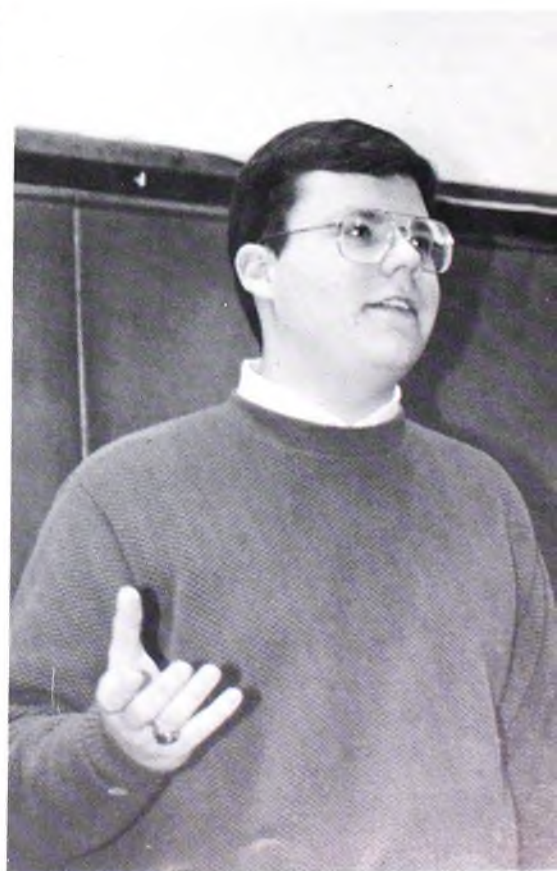

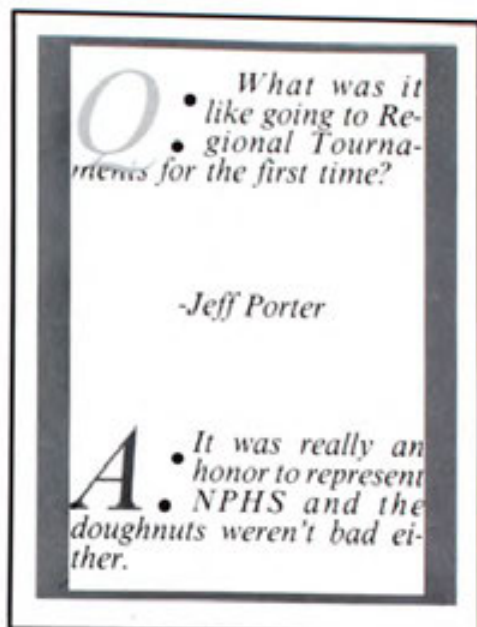
Scholar Challenge

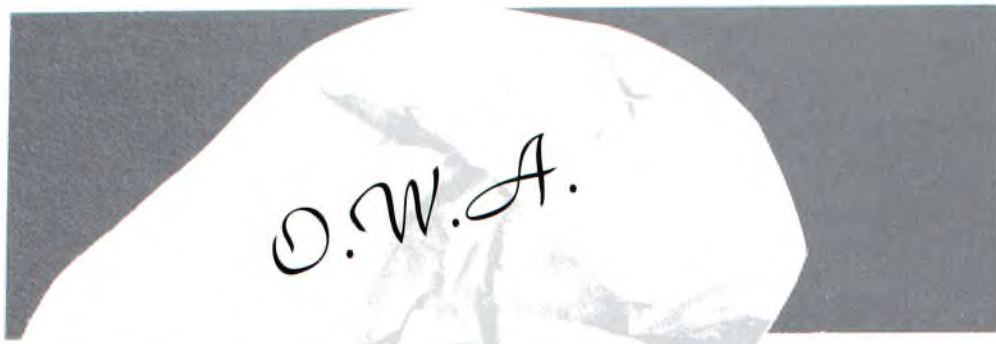

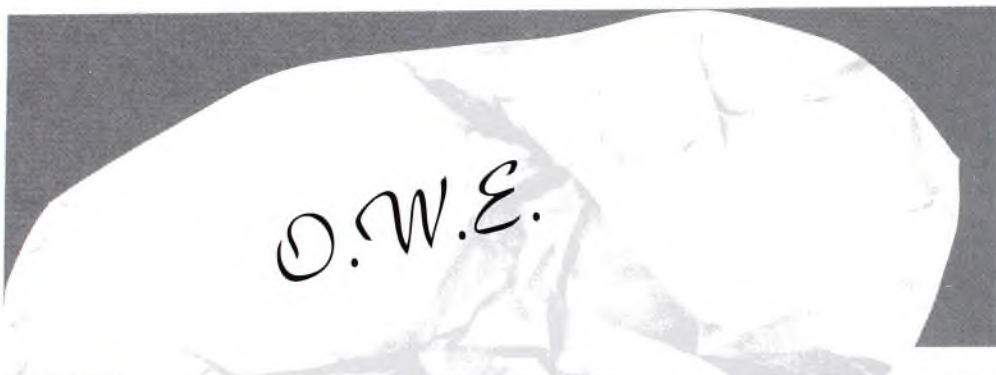

As sophomores, students have to make an important decision, What they are going to do with their last two years of high school.

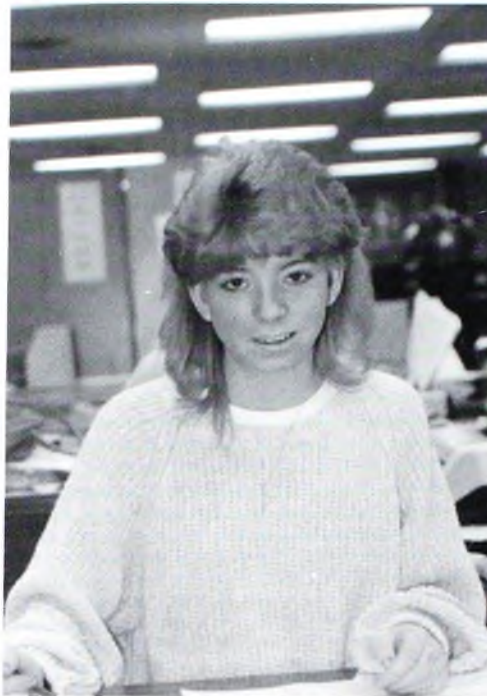
Students may decide to attend Buckeye Joint Vocational School where they learn a new trade and shortly after graduating they are able to get a job.

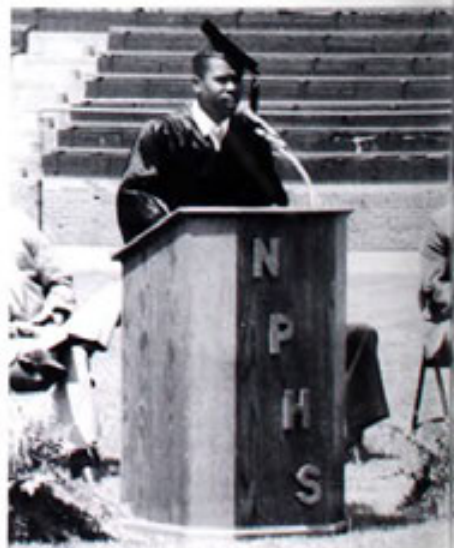
