With it's blessisg from the Tuscarswas Cousty Regional Planning Commission, some minor objections from TAPS (Taxpayers Agaiast Public Sub. sides) and the official ending of the 1986 "mall wars", a groundbreaking ceremony went as planned, despite an anonymous call threatening violesce. ## Election'88

## Bush Wins; Dukakis Not Even Close

The national general election for President of the United States was held on November 8, 1988. In a landslide victory, Vice-President George Bush won over Governor Mike Dukakis by about 40 states. Vice-President Bush slso won in the electorial college by about 186 wotes. Bush will be taking over the Presidency from Bonald Reagan in Janaary, 1989

In the weeks before the election, Dukakis whipped out his mud sling and started shooting. He accused George Bush of being a wimp,arrogant,and a conservative. But, president-elect Bush had called Governo: Dukakis a liberal(the Lword), old softie, abortionist, and cheapskate.

This was one of the worst mud-slinging campaigns in history.

On a cleaser note, $76 \%$ of the Now Phila. High School student body turned out to vote in our school's mock election which was organized by Mr. Miller and his history stadents. $68 \%$ voled for George Bush, about $20 \%$ less than the national level. Only 32\% voted for Michael Dukakis. In addition to the presidential voting, students also voted for State Senator, and for the issues of open lunch and B.R.A.(revised room assignment). In the race for State Senator, Howard Metrenbaum won $54 \%$ to George Voinovich's $46 \%$. The wording on the open lunch issue
was very tricky. It was used to make the voter think and read the question very thoroughly. The question was worded like this, "Should the current policy of an open lunch period at N.P.H.S. not be repealed?" Some people who voted didn't catch this and they voted "no". But moat got the question right. $70 \%$ got it right while $30 \%$ missed the point. The last question on the ballot was if R.R.A. was an effective means of punishment. "no" was the resounding answer by a $57 \%$ vote for no and a $43 \%$ vote for yes. The percentage of student voters was about the same as the national level with the same resalts.

## Space Shuttle Launch

## You Were Perfect

On Thursday, September 29,1988, at exactly 11:37 AM, the 26th space shuttle mission had begun. The spaceship named the Discovery was launched from Cape Canaveral,Florida.The five astronauts were all very nervous and greatly anticipating this wonderful experience. They were Richard Covey, David Hilmers,George Nelson, Mike Lounge, and Rick Hauck. In preperation
for the flight each system was checked and rechecked and tested many times to prevent any unfortunate mishaps. They had to be very careful to avoid another accident like the Challenger.The liftoff was perfect and the Discovery and its crew was then in orbit 184 miles from the earth. The commander, Frederick H. Hauck, told Mission Control"We're looking forward to the next four
days - we have a lot to do and we're going to have a lot of fun doing it. " The next four days were very busy, as there were many things to be done. The major goals were to deploy a $\$ 100$ million Tracking and Data Relay, to be used to communicate with orbiting shuttles and other spacecraft; also they had to check more than 400 modifications made to shuttle systems since Challenger, and conduct eleven scienti-
fic and technological experiments. They returned back to earth at 9:37 AM,on October 3, at Edwards Air Force Base,California. The mission was nearly flawless.NASA is aiming to increase its launch schedule to fourteen flights per year by 1993, which is the same year it hopes to begin building a space station.

## Yesterday's Sidewalk Surfing

Skateboarding, a sport that many people are beginning to enjoy has been around for many years.

At first skateboards attracted older feenagers, but today many kids ten years old and under spend their spare time on boards, which cost over a hundred dollars each.

In the 1960 's, surfers would skateboard on days when there was no surf. They wanted the feeling on land they got while surfing. The first skateboards were merely $2^{\prime}$ by $4^{\prime}$ with rollerskate wheels.

During the 1970 's, skateboarding im. proved dramaticly. Bet-
ter wheels were developed in 1975 and new moves were invented; $360^{\prime} \mathrm{s}$, kickflips, and handstands were a few of the first tricks akaters perfected, and "Skaterboarder " magazine was first published.
1976 marked the year of the skateparks. Swimming pools were drained and used as places to skate, yet skaters were still looking for bigger and better thrills.
By 1978, Skateboards became wider and more color was added. Difficult tricks were developed; handplants, ollies, and slides. Skaters used streets and curbs for

## practice.

But in 1980, things changed. Skateparks were shutfung down. Even the " Skatebearder " magazine west out of print. The skateboarding fad seemed to be over.

In 1981 however, ramps popped up: Skater's were back!! Skateboard parks went back into business, this time stronger then ewer before.

1985, when street skating was at a high point, many cities made it illegal. Dover, Ohio was one of these cities.

cousty ramp. The counsel declined their request.
