In the second quarter, the Tornadoes scored twice. But with 16 seconds left in the half, senior Heath Knisely took the kickoff after a Dover touchdown, and ran 95 yards for the Quaker score. New Phila continued to dominate the game throughout the second half, as senior Joe Brasacchio scored on runs of 1 and 34 yards.

Quaker quarterback junior Eric Williams ended the game with 97 yards passing, as he completed 4-of-8 passes. The New Phila team 22 carries, while senior Chad Hutchison had 83 yards on 13 carries. Heath Knisely, the game MVP and the Quaker's leading receiver, ended with 3 receptions for 77 yards. On defense, he















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











There is a wide variety of Science courses offered at NPHS. After the required year of freshman Physical Science, science is no longer required for graduation. But many students continue their studies by taking Biology, Biology II, Chemistry, Chemistry II, Geology, or Physics during their sophomore, junior, and senior years. Although history is not stressed during students' freshman year at NPHS, it becomes a required course throughout the remainder of high school. In each of the history classes, students have the option of taking the regular class or an optional seminar class. The seminar classes carry a weighted point value during a student's junior and senior years. As elective classes in history, a student may take Sociology, Economics, American Minorities, and World Today.

World History, taken by all sophomores, is a student's first required class in the history department. The following year, American History must be taken. Although both World History and American History are year long classes, Government, the required class for seniors, lasts only one semester.

To many students, the business classes offered are a very important start to a future career. In the business department, a student may take General Business, Business Law, Business Communications, Word Processing, Record Keeping, Notehand, Typing I and II, Accounting, and Senior V.I.P. In Senior V.I.P., students are given the opportunity to spend part of each day using their business knowledge by working around the school and communitv.



There are many different levels of math classes offered at NPHS. General Math 9, General Math 10, Consumer Math, Pre-Algebra, Algebra I, Algebra II, Geometry, Transition to College Math, Math IV, and Calculus are all offered, as two years are required for graduation. Some students choose to take two math classes in one year. "By doubling up on classes this year I

Advanced classes are offered for Geometry, Algebra II, Math IV, and Calculus. All of these classes except Geometry carry a weighted point value.


















In Memory of ...
