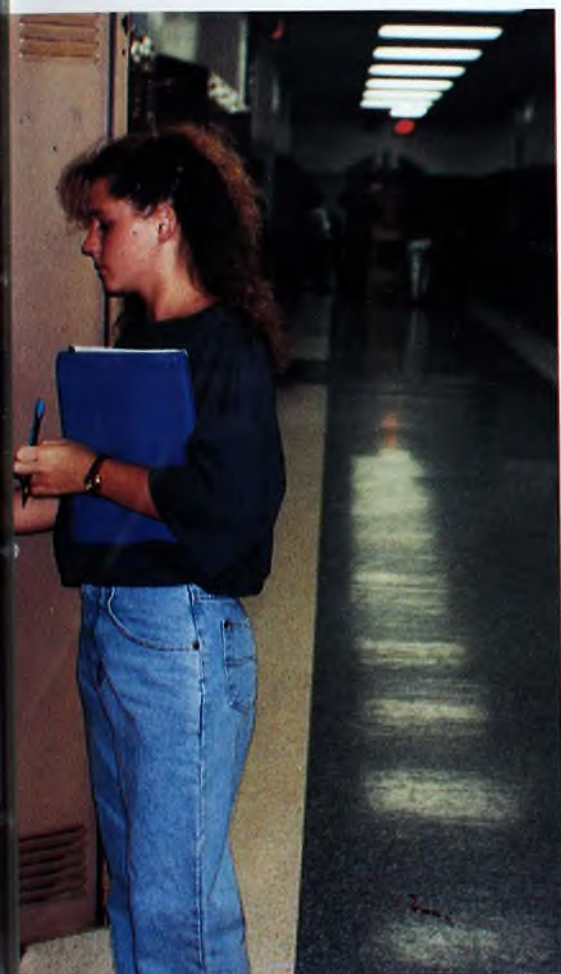

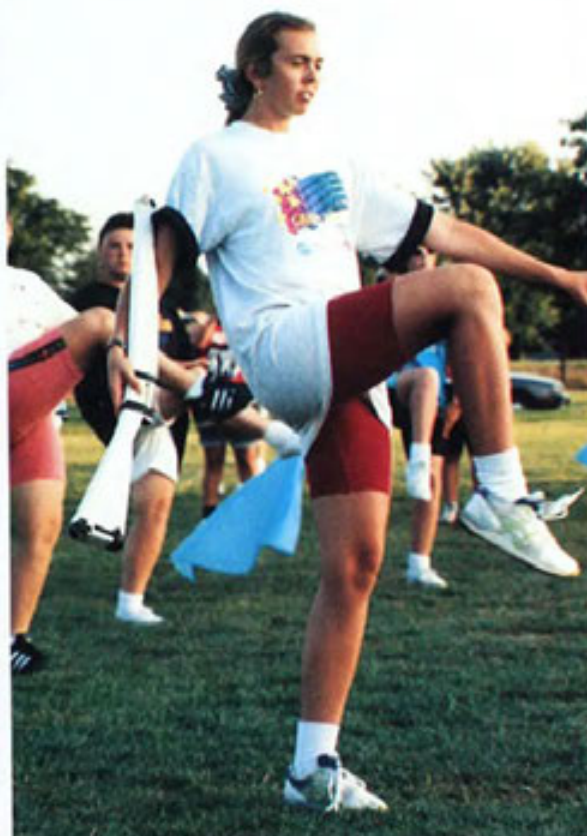

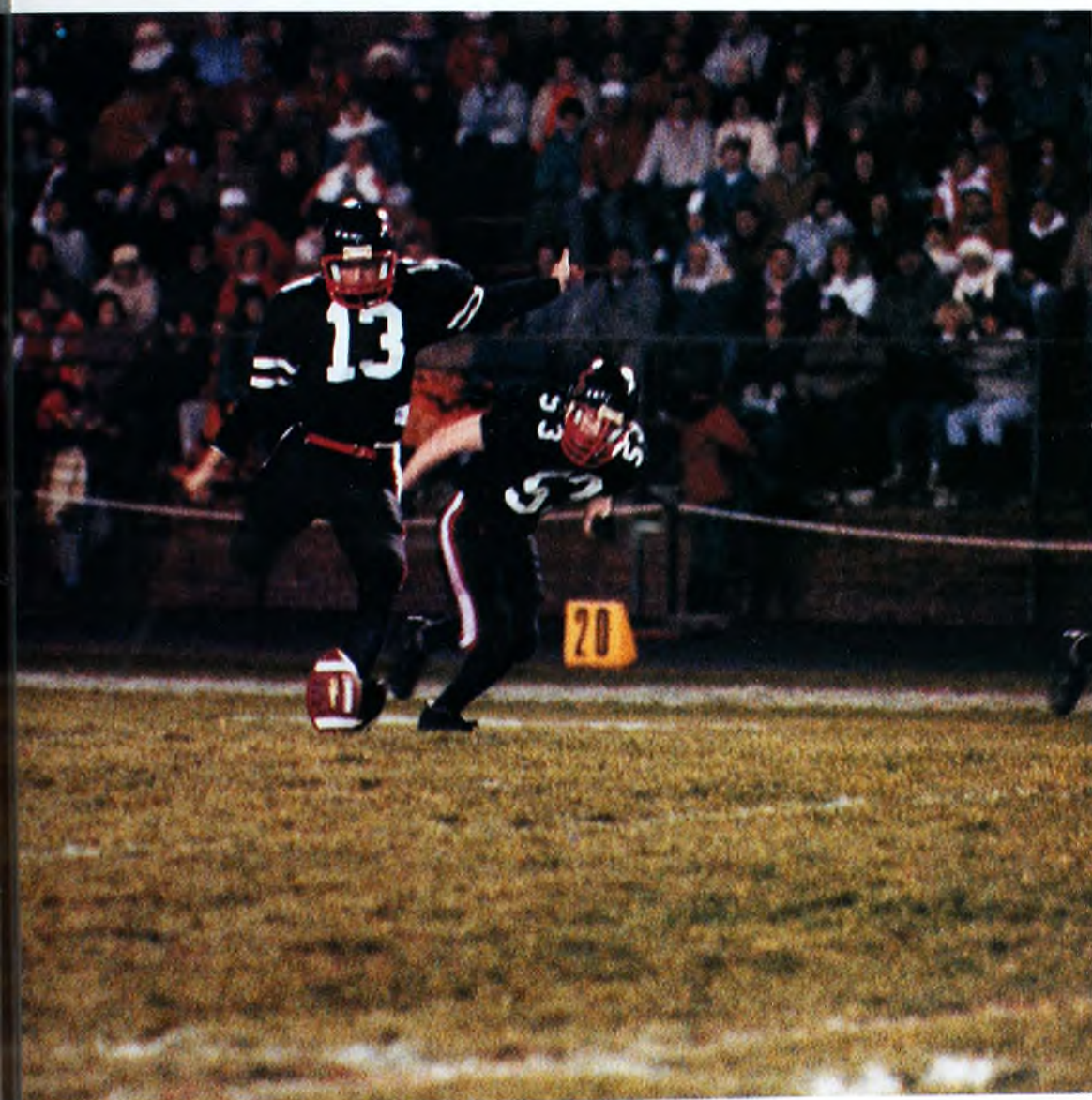

The sweaters, sweatshirts, and shirts chosen by students to wear

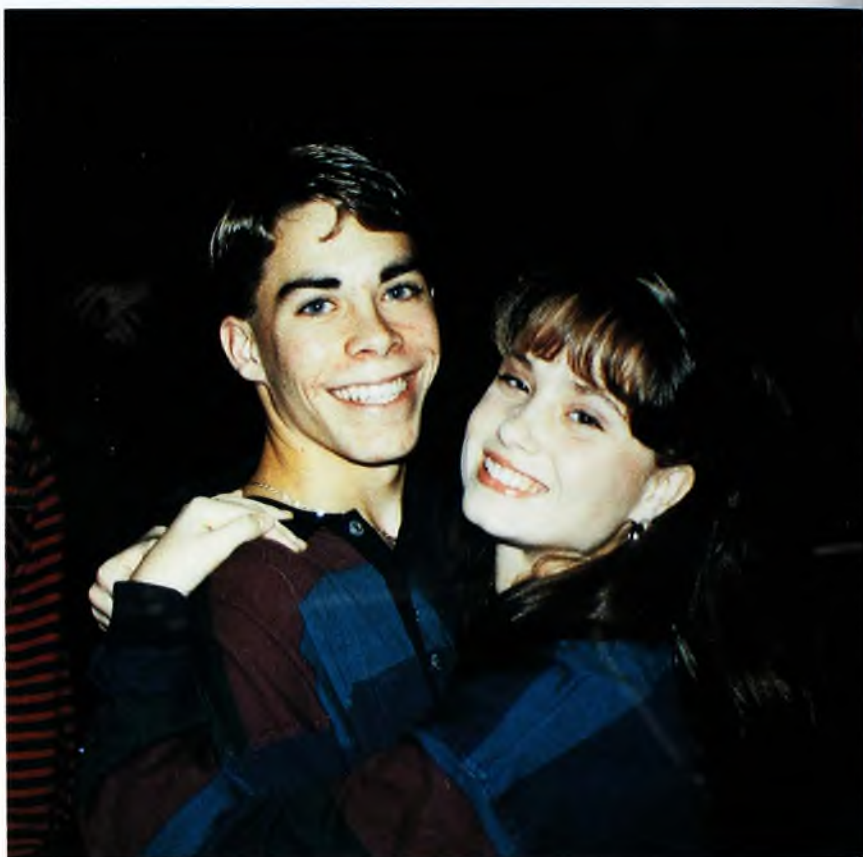
varied as much as their hairstyles and dance moves.

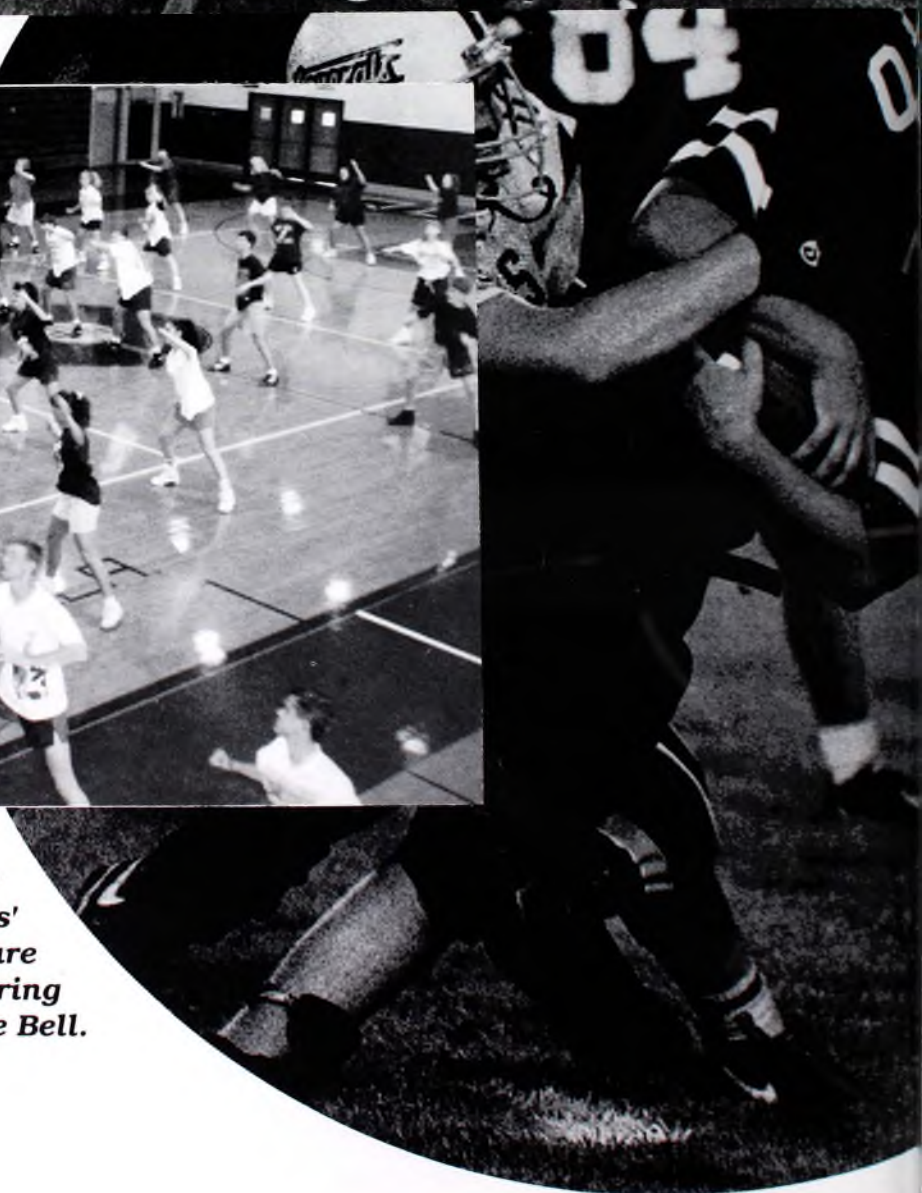

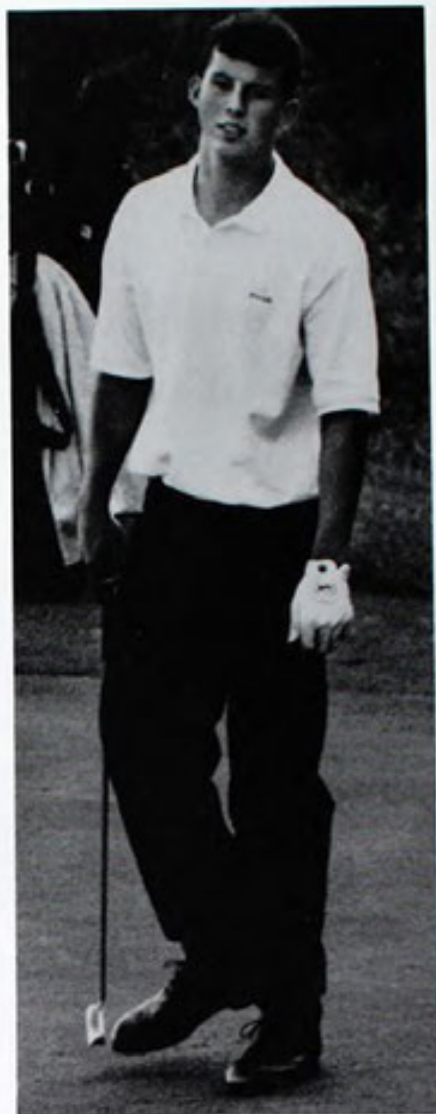

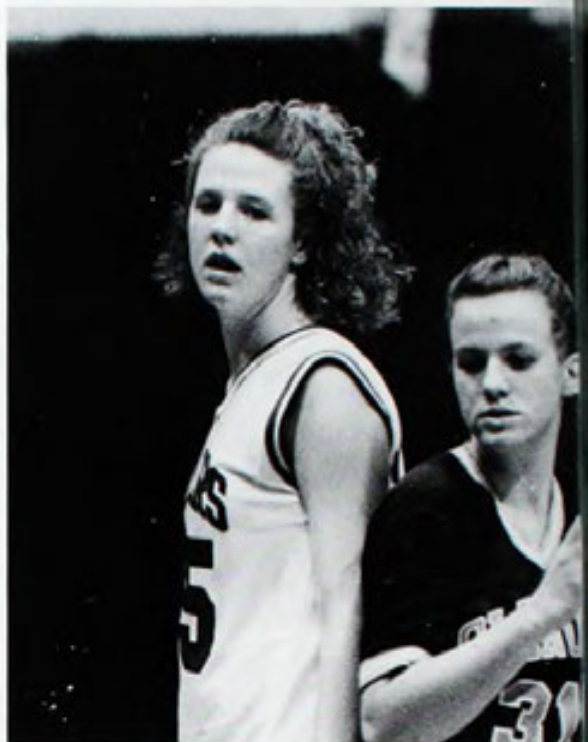

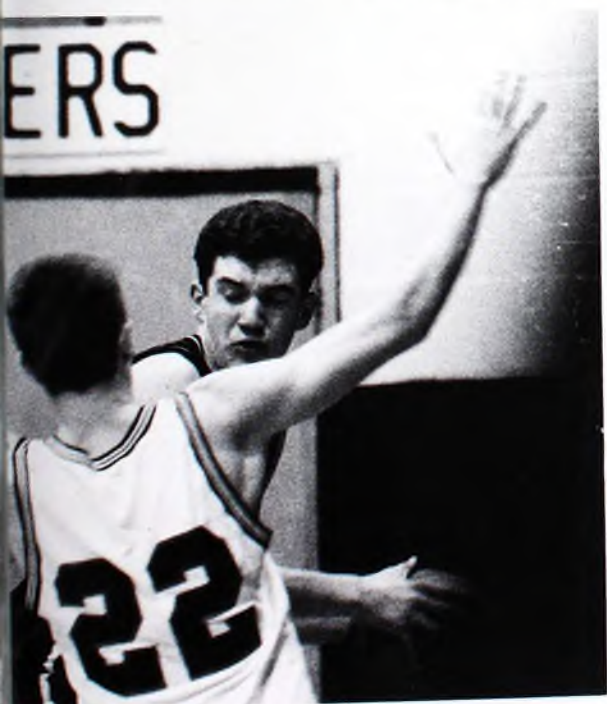

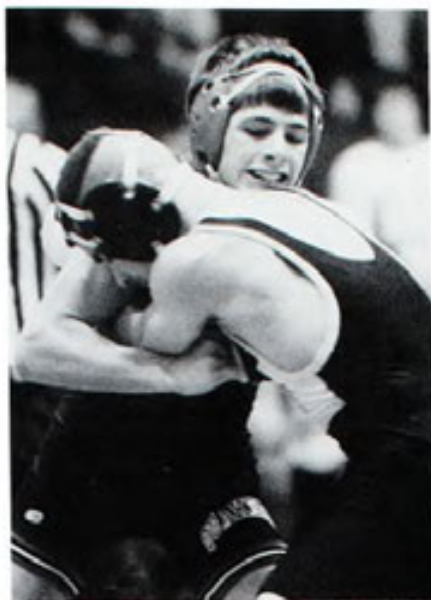

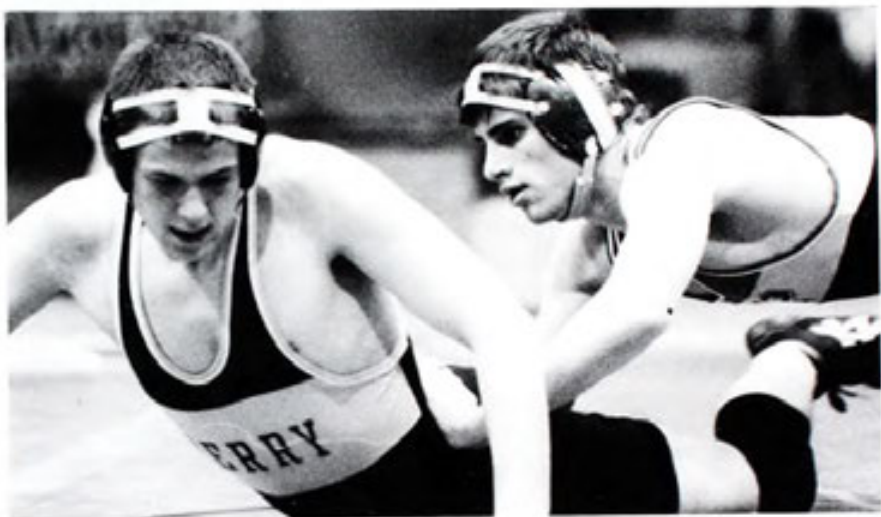

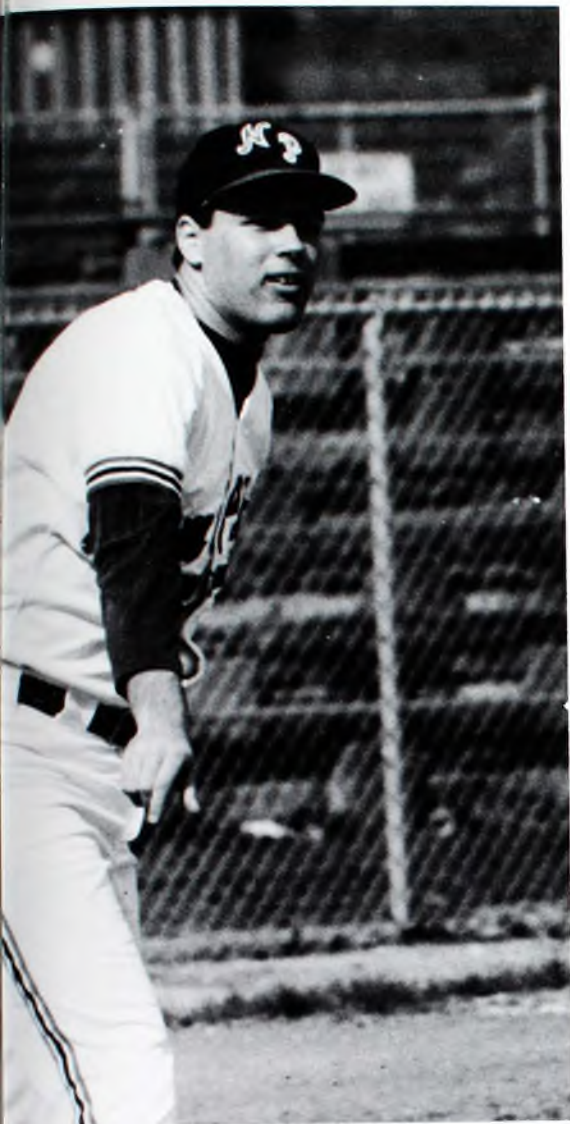

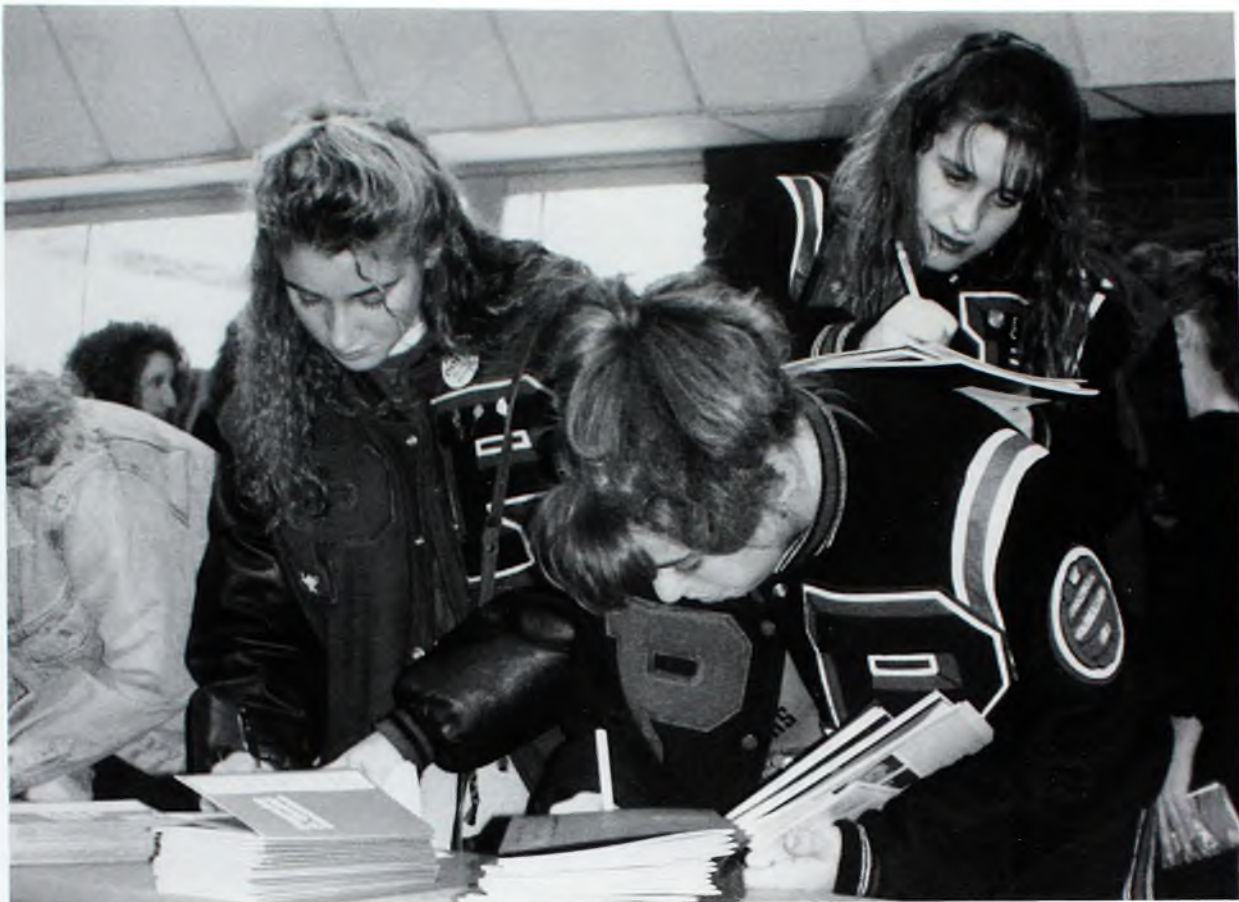

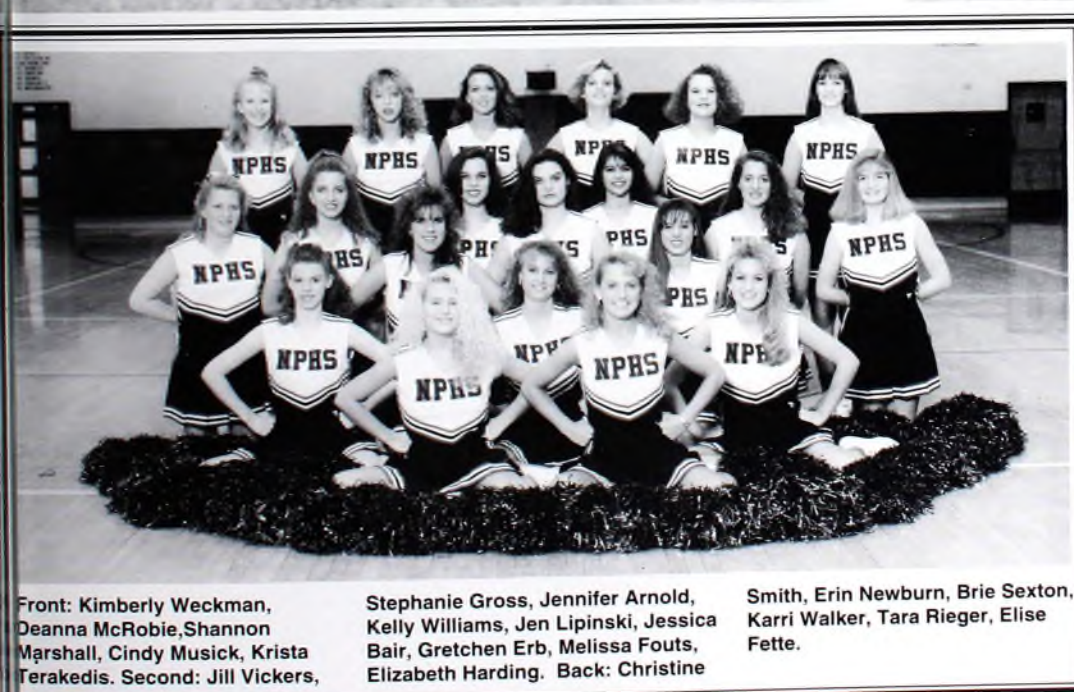

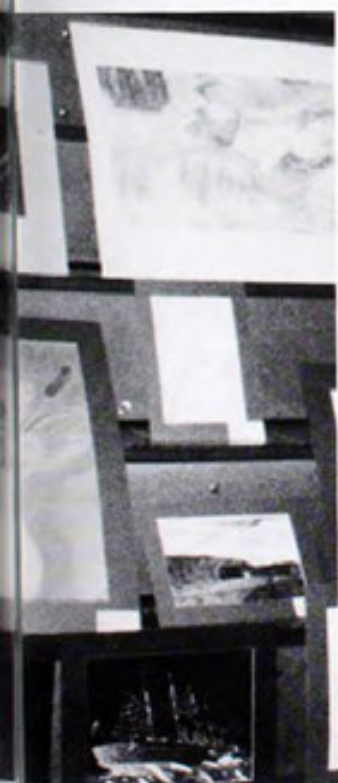

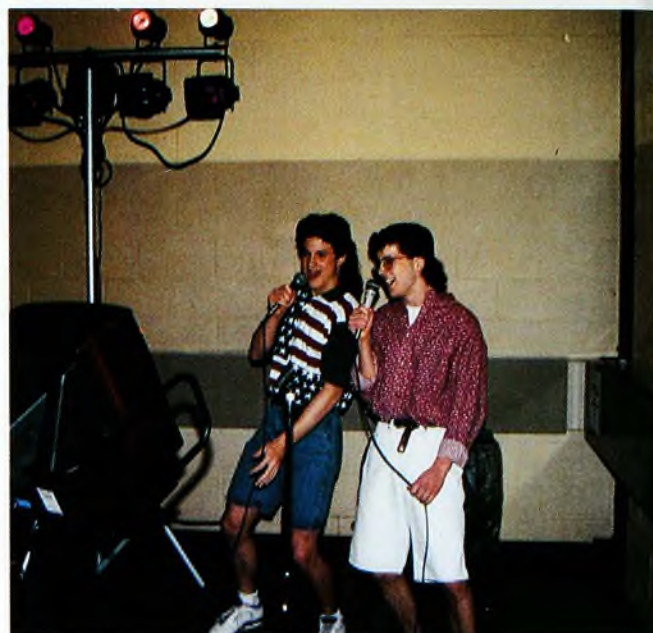
