Michael Jordan, a basketball superstar who played for the Chicago Bulls retired this year. Two students surveyed wanted him to come back, three said he should stay * out, and five said it was his choice. Sophomore Brian Feller said, "He's already proven he's a great basketball player, and now hemay want to move on to new and more challenging goals." Renee McWilliams went on a different note by saying, "Personally, I would like to see him play for the Chicago White Sox." Tracy Quicksall commented, "No matter what he does, people will always remember him."
Six students felt it was necessary to put condom machines in the school while four felt they weren't needed. Angie Fisher answered, "New Phila doesn't really need a condom machine, but it would be safer to have one around." Most felt that condoms would be easier to
obtain if they were sold in the school and that it would prevent a lot of teen pregnancies.
This year our high school cafeteria was decorated with new tables-round, instead of rectangular, and chairs instead of benches. The results? Seven people preferred the new ones, thinking it was more comfortable and gave more room to move. Three liked the old ones better because they fit more people and made our school unique.
A big change this year was the banning of football fairies, a tradition at New Phila for over twenty years. Some felt it was an issue of sexual harrassment, having senior guys dress up as fairies. All surveyed on this question felt that they were a harmless tradition and would love to see them back, but felt it would affect us more when we were seniors. Cono Barbera thought that "some people take subjects like that to an extreme,"
and Brie Sexton put in, "They were just a bunch of crazy guys having fun. It was great to watch them act, they got the crowd going." Students also commented that they were disappointed in the amount of school spirit.
Another new rule added was that students would not be allowed carrying bookbags from class to class or wear coats in the classroom. This was to discourage weapons and forbidden objects from being brought into the school. Nearly all felt this rule was unnecessary because students could find other ways to bring in items not allowed. Some felt that there wasn't even a problem of weapons in our school. Dan Joseph felt that "Student's shouldn't be punished or have privileges taken away until those privileges have been abused by them." Despite the changes made, sophomores handled their second high school
year well, and with a fairly good attitude about the future. Most were hoping for more changes, while wishing some things would remain the same. Whatever was to come the class of '96 felt prepared.
