




As another year opened, New Philadelphia High School students found that many situations were finally starting to













in Dover. Following this, the final game of the season, the Quakers ended their year with a 2-8 record.











Both teams had their tight games, the outcome resting on an error or a solid hit. All learned valuable lessons about the game.








# Keeping Focused





Michael Jordan, a basketball superstar who played for the Chicago Bulls retired this year. Two students surveved wanted him to come back, three said he should stay out, and five said it was his choice. Sophomore Brian Feller said, "He's already proven he's a great basketball player, and now hemay want to move on to new and more challenging goals." Renee McWilliams went on a different note by saying, "Personally, I would like to see him play for the Chicago White Sox." Tracy Quicksall commented, "No matter what he does, people will always remember him."


# THE NEW BEGINNING










As the year closed at New Phila h e High, dents Thealook stucould to see back how they had progressed, the changes that had and been made and the many things they
